Friendswood mayor honored in Wadsworth Mural

Mayor Mike Foreman is no stranger to ribbon-cutting events in Friendswood and the mural unveiling on April 1st was fairly routine, apart from the fact that it was 1100 miles away from home in Wadsworth, Ohio.

Commissioned by Main Street Wadsworth and painted by artist Tim Carmany, the mural features the Friendswood Mayor on a spacewalk in orbit around Earth. Foreman grew up in Wadsworth before leaving to attend the Naval Academy in 1975. Eventually his career brought him to Friendswood where he trained to become an astronaut, but he still has family and fond memories in Wadsworth.

The Main Street Wadsworth Art Mural Subcommittee oversees all downtown mural projects. Committee Chair Randy Toddy said, "The Art Mural Project is a continuing effort to highlight Wadsworth's history through artistic interpretations of our past and present." The event also featured NASA Glenn Research Center's Chief of Communications, David DeFelice who spoke on behalf of the space agency.

You don't have to look far to see some par-

allels between Wadsworth and Friendswood. Located just north of Wadsworth is the Glenn Research Center which hosts roughly 3,000 NASA employees and contractors. Johnson Space Center, by comparison, hosts a work-



force of about 14,000. Both suburban cities are home to less than 50,000 people with Wadsworth sitting at around 28,000 and Friendswood tipping the scale at roughly 40,000.

The most striking similarity between the two cities, however, is the shared interest in public art and the organizations that fund them. Both Wadsworth and Friendswood have invested in downtown murals in recent years. And in both cases, the initiative came from a non-profit lead by volunteers. Like Main Street Wadsworth, the Friends of Downtown Friendswood Association (FDFA) is a non-profit that was formed for the purpose of breathing new life into the city's main street. The two Friendswood murals on either side of HomeTown Center were commissioned and funded by FDFA.

Perhaps these grassroots efforts of economic revitalization are becoming increasingly common across the country. Or perhaps the two cities have much more in common than the man Friendswood has come to know as Mayor Mike.

Pre-K Early Enrollment:

- This is a full-day program offered at all elementaries
- Students must be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2022
- Must live in Pearland ISD school zone
- Must meet one of the eligibility criteria below to qualify for the program:

Limited English Proficient: Be unable to speak and comprehend the English language. (Eligibility is based on results of Language Testing performed by Pearland ISD)

Educationally Disadvantaged: Eligible to participate in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), including students who receive any of the following benefits:

- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)
- Foster Care or Previously in Foster Care:** Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS) Placement Authorization Form 2085, Court Order, or DFPS Letter of Verification required.

Homeless: Children who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence and/or who are sharing housing with others due to the loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason may qualify. Student Residency and Assistance Questionnaire (SRQ) required.

Military Families: The child of a parent who is an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States,

including the state military forces or a reserved component of the armed forces, who is ordered to active duty by proper authority or the child of a parent of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserved component of the armed forces, who was injured or killed while serving on active duty.

Star of Service Award: The child's parent/guardian has received the Star of Texas Award as a peace officer, firefighter, or an emergency medical first responder.

Kindergarten Early Enrollment:

- Students must be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2022
- Live in Pearland ISD school zone

How Do I Begin Enrollment?

Visit www.pearlandisd.org/kinder or www.pearlandisd.org/prek to begin the early enrollment process for 2022-23.

All students enrolling in Pearland ISD must complete the process online. The district uses a New Student Online Enrollment (NSOE) portal where parents must enter all your information and upload all the required documents.

Early pre-kindergarten enrollment is only for students who will attend their zoned campus and have all the required documents at early enrollment time.

Required Documents to upload:

- Deed or current home lease (current Pearland ISD property tax statement may be used in place of deed to home; apartment lease must list parent as lessee and student as occupant)
- Current utility bill (water, gas, electricity) with correct address of residence (in parent/guardian name)
- Photo ID of parent enrolling student (current state, federal or international photo ID)
- Birth certificate showing parent enrolling student named as parent (official preferred, certified copy acceptable)
- Immunization record (official)
- Student's Social Security card (SSN is recommended but not required. A student who does not provide or have a SSN will be assigned a state identification number)

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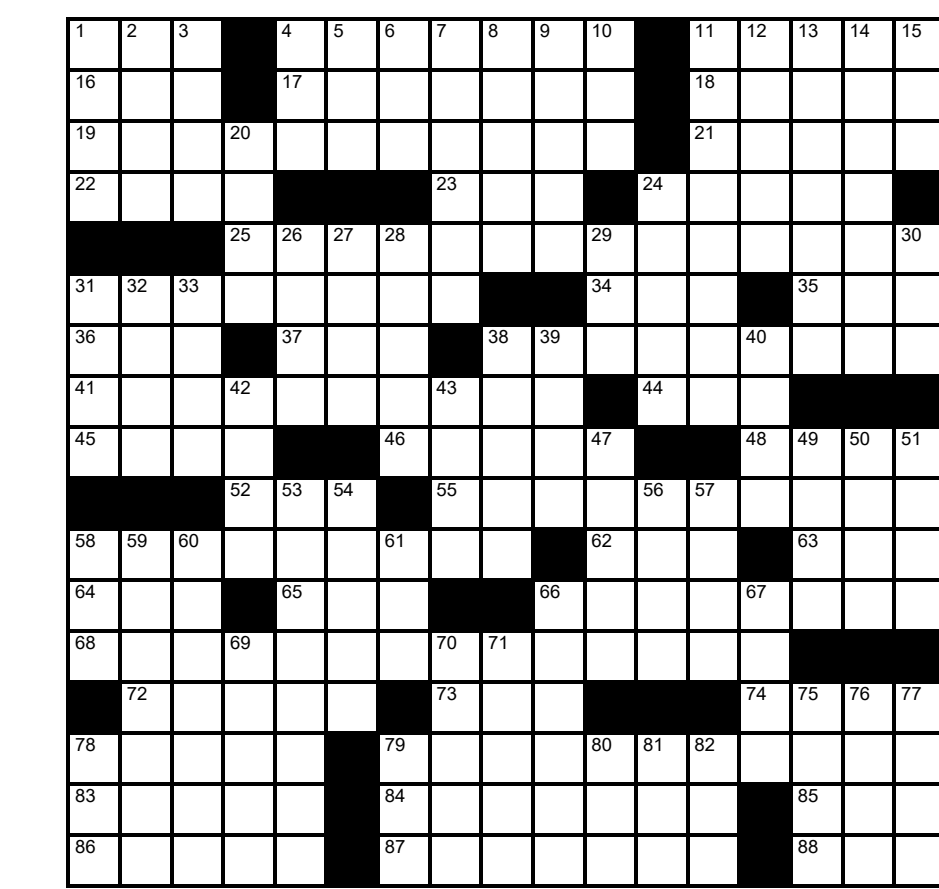

THE BUDDING GARDENER

Tis the Season for Garden Tours

I love visiting other people's gardens to get ideas for my own yard, check out different styles of landscaping and discover new plants or combinations of plants. While it's nice to drive by and see front yards, back yards reveal homeowners' passions, leisure interests and hobbies. One way to get invited to the backyard is by invitation with a ticket to a garden club sponsored garden tour.



In March I headed to the River Oaks Garden Club's Azalea Trail, an opportunity to see some of Houston's most exceptional gardens. Tickets included entrance to two public gardens at Bayou Bend and The Rienzi along with the The Forum of Civics (garden club home) and four private gardens.

This year there was an abundance of beautiful garden club created floral displays outside dotting the properties. Tour attendees were directed to the backyards where glimpses of kitchens and other living areas could be viewed only through oversized windows and patio doors. With no lines to enter the residences this year, touring times were shortened yet felt more leisurely.

River Oaks garden club design teams did a fantastic job of creating an abundance of floral displays, decorated outdoor dining areas and numerous vignettes. One home had a table setting featuring navy, orange and yellow European style dishes complemented by bright containers of yellow tulips, deep blue delphinium and yellow alstroemeria. An Arts & Crafts styled home featured a 1930 Model A Roadster with an abundance of spring flowers filling up a rear travel trunk and large sprays of flowers flowing out of an opened car door. The lavish display of agapanthus, liatris, pink roses, daisy like chamomile flowers, yellow daffodils and gladiolas in the roadster was a show stopper with the double seated bike showcasing large floral displays in front and back bike baskets coming in a close second. There were many other notable displays including a beautiful peony and hydrangea swag on a wrought iron entrance rail, many compositions made from flowers that looked like cakes, ice-



cream sundaes, a backgammon board, butterflies and floral chair pads. Homeowner gardens featured statues, large and small, swimming pools with water features and one grassy area featured two "ladies" playing croquet with human like forms clothed in white alyssum, white petunias and one dressed with a layered tropical leaf skirt with a back facing geranium and ivy bustle reminiscent of *The Gilded Age*. Yet another house paraded a line of bikes and a rickshaw, highlighting flowers in numerous attached baskets.

If you would like to attend a garden tour, there is one coming up April 23 & 24 in Friendswood sponsored by the Heritage Gardeners Garden Club. Tickets will gain entrance to five private gardens and the Briscoe Gardens, the garden club's public garden. Each homeowner's style is apparent in every one of the unique garden spaces. The title themes on the ticket hint at what you'll discover in each of the landscapes.

The "Mediterranean Oasis" features an elegant pool area surrounded by numerous majestic palm trees with soothing sounds from waterfalls not far from an outdoor kitchen and entertainment areas, one which features a six hole putting green, all surrounded by colorful flowering annuals.

Relaxing blue and purple hues dominate in the pool area, outdoor playset and flowers at the beautiful and cozy yard of "Family Time".

A pool, Koi fish filled pond with waterfall, orchid wall and many different kinds of plants including succulent collections are featured in a Master Gardener's "Tropical Hideaway".

Hardcore vegetable gardeners will be impressed by the large edible garden at the "Friendswood Farm". The farm also features cute rabbits, bee hives, rows of plumeria, fig trees and blackberry vines.

A lot of creative surprises await at the expansive property of "A Whimsical Walk". Here you'll want to linger to search out all the different areas of garden art and hanging planters, visit the "She Shed" and view some very unique containers filled with plants.

The Heritage Gardeners Spring Garden Tour is April 23 & 24 from 1-5pm. Tickets can be purchased at the clubhouse on the days of the tour. The clubhouse, located at 112 W. Spreading Oaks, Friendswood, TX will be open 9am to 5pm, during the garden tour, for both the Spring Market that Saturday and a new Gardeners Market on Sunday. ON PRIVILEGE

“But you’re a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God’s special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light. 10 Once you were not a people, but now you are the people of God; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.”

- 1 Peter 2:9-10

Every once in a while, I feel like I’ve been tossed into the growing pile of men labeled those with... “white, male, privilege.” I don’t bring up the topic... it’s usually someone else and the comments are less specific in terms of names, addresses and phone numbers but nonetheless I’m given the look that the only reason I’m able to do anything at all or have had one iota of success in life is because my parents gave me no choice. And when that happens, I normally balk at the notion.

My parents didn’t grow up with privilege. They were poor. Their fathers drank too much. My father’s parents divorced when he was fourteen... in the middle of WW2. My mother was the seventh of nine children. When she was eight years old her mother was killed by a hit and run driver. Not long after that her father ran away from home... for 23 years. That sounds a lot more like desperation than privilege as I wouldn’t want those kinds of life details for my children and grandchildren... nor yours... nor anyone’s...

In its truest sense ... ‘privilege’ is a special right, an advantage, or immunity granted or available only to a particular person or group... according to a quick google search... and I might add in most cases privilege is an unsolicited gift or earned. Some might say... so is a slap in the face.

When St. Peter wrote what we call his first letter... it was addressed to the Jewish people who had dispersed to other regions around the Mediterranean Sea... and there were many of them... often ridiculed and chided for what others viewed as a privileged heritage. But, as one reads that letter it’s easy to see how Peter points out everything has

changed because of Jesus’ life, death, resurrection and return to glory with the Father via his ascension into heaven... not a privilege but a purpose as the story declares... as long as we cannot save ourselves from sin and destruction... only Jesus could. Then did... with Peter pointing out... “The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner,” (1 Peter 2:7b) describing a great irony that the limestone left behind (*rejected*) used to build the walls around Jerusalem became the site of Jesus’ crucifixion... the remaining stone labeled... “Golgotha” ... the ‘hill of the skull’ ... as from a distance people could see a face... like we would see a carved pumpkin... haunting eyes, a nose and mouth leftover from the better stones removed. The Church of the Holy Sepulchre was built over it and stands in Jerusalem to this day.

As I write these words, I’m mindful that Holy Week is just days away. Palm Sunday is on the doorstep and pushes us toward remembering the last supper and holy meal Jesus shared with his closest friends, the events of Good Friday where God was silent to the cries of a one and only son dying the cruel death of crucifixion but having that event overturned by Jesus’ glorious resurrection from the grave announcing eternal life to all who would believe... which makes all the difference for each day I live...

Yet, I’m mindful, also, the world can still be a mess... not a result of a privilege from God but a result of selfishness, greed, and a lack of desire for a justice for all... Faith matters. It does. It will. It always will... for if what we believe deep in our hearts leads us to a life of praise of God and service to our neighbor... that is a privilege I will always embrace. I hope you can, too.

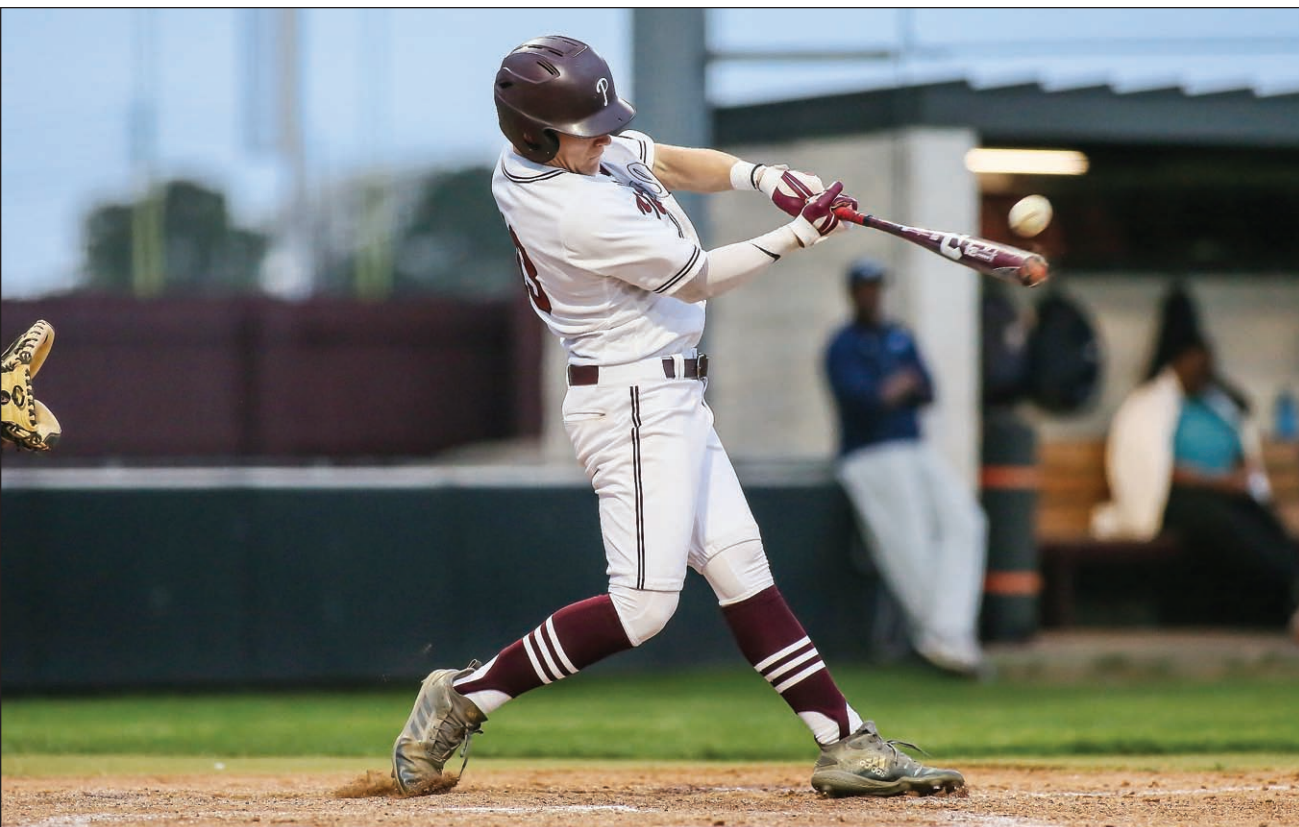
