Lady Mustangs fall to No. 1 Lake Creek in softball playoffs

The best-of-three series between the Friendswood Lady Mustangs and the Montgomery Lake Creek Lady Lions didn't go according to plan as the Lady Lions blanked the Lady Mustangs 8-0 and 10-0 to sweep the Class 5A Region III semifinal matchup.

"This series is tough, but you learn from it," said Christa Williams-Yates, the Lady Mustangs' head coach. "It's just like last year, Lake Creek fell short to Barbers Hill and that was their motivating force, in my opinion. It would be for me."

"Hopefully this team can use that as something that will drive them."

Friendswood found out why Lake Creek is ranked No. 1 and is undefeated at 37-0 while advancing to the 5A Region III finals.

In Game 1, Friendswood was held to four hits and no runs while Lake Creek scored a run

in the second, fourth, two in the fifth and four in the sixth to blank the Lady Mustangs 8-0.

Lake Creek banged out 11 hits for eight runs off Friendswood's Chloe Riassetto who took the loss.

In Game 2, Friendswood managed six hits without scoring a run while the Lady Lions had nine hits for 10 runs against Friendswood pitcher Janelle Wilson who took the loss.

Riassetto and catcher Maddie Wilson are the lone Lady Mustang graduates and Williams-Yates is hoping a group of underclassmen can follow their lead into next spring.

"I think we all knew as staff that we had the potential to be good," Williams-Yates said. "We knew they were super gifted. It was just whether or not we could put them into places that we felt like we'd be successful, and they could actually buy in."

"And that was the one great thing about this team. They bought in and trusted us."

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DHS team places first at UIL Academic State Meet

Dawson High School recently participated in the 2022 UIL Academic State Meet in social studies, ready writing and science. The social studies team representing the school took the gold in their category.

At the UIL academic meet, participants earned points for their school team in different subject areas. The following team placed in their category:

Social Studies: First Place Team

- Lauren Cross (5th place overall)

Also competing were Hantao Jin who placed 2nd in the spelling and vocabulary category and was coached by Kerry Burkett, Jacqueline Xiong who placed 2nd in literary criticism and was coached by Jessica Myers and Ethan Loyless who placed 5th in ready writing and was coached by Leslie Sanderson.

The four events DHS competed in at state were comprised of a multiple-choice tests and essays over the subject material.

The social studies test had 45 multiple-choice questions with an essay over the subject material. In the ready writing contest students were given a choice between 2 prompts to write an expository essay. The spelling and vocabulary contest consisted of multiple-choice questions covering proof-reading and vocabulary, and words written from dictation. The literary criticism contest

involved multiple-choice questions which required students to use literary judgment and to analyze literary passages from both the reading list and other sources. If a tiebreaker was required, the student would write a short essay dealing with a specified topic about a selected literary passage from both the reading list and other sources.

Students were eligible to advance to state as an individual if they placed in the top three in the region or as the top team in the region. These students competed against students from eight high schools at the district level and seven districts at the regional level to advance to state.

The University Interscholastic League offers a wide variety of academic contests for high school students, encompassing many elements of required high school coursework. These contests build upon the academic skills developed in the classroom and offer students an opportunity to stretch their talents above and beyond those requirements.

UIL Academics activities, which exist to complement the academic curriculum, are designed to motivate students as they acquire higher levels of knowledge, to challenge students to confront issues of importance and to provide students with the opportunity to demonstrate mastery of specific skills. Students are challenged to think critically and creatively, exhibiting much more than knowledge and comprehension.

Pearland ISD celebrates Better Hearing, Speech Month

In honor of Better Hearing and Speech Month in May, Pearland Independent School District recognizes its professional speech-language pathologists (SLPs) for supporting the academic success of students with hearing and communication challenges.

Pearland ISD's 27 SLPs help prevent, identify, assess and treat speech and language problems that impact students' achievement.

"Speech-language pathologists work with people every day in settings that include schools, private practices, health care facilities and even their own homes to improve their speech, language, social and cognitive skills," said Pearland ISD lead SLP Mary Kate Puna.

According to many SLPs, children today are at great risk of hearing loss from unsafe use of personal audio devices and exposure to noisy activities. Guidelines from the World Health Organization recommend that children spend no more than 40 hours listening to a personal audio device per week, at levels no higher than 75 decibels, to prevent hearing damage. Many technology devices and accessories reach volumes above 100 decibels, and even headphones marketed as "kid safe" routinely exceed 85 or even 90 decibels. This makes ongoing vigilance important.

Puna advises that the following simple steps can help protect children's hearing:

- Turn the volume down (even on "vol-

ume-limiting" products). Some headphones claim to have maximum noise output levels that won't damage hearing. But studies have shown that these claims aren't always reliable and offer a false sense of security. *The best bet is for kids to keep the volume at half level.*

Use noise-canceling earbuds/headphones. Noise-canceling earbuds or headphones can reduce the need to crank up the volume and help kids hear better by drowning out external noise.

Take regular listening breaks. Encourage kids to give their ears a rest and take hourly breaks, even if just for a few minutes. The potential for hearing damage hinges on how long a person listens as much as how loud they listen.

Model safe use. Practice what you preach by watching your own volume and taking other prevention steps. You'll be a great example—and you'll protect your own hearing, too.

Help children appreciate their hearing. Talk to kids about why safe listening is important, so they understand that you aren't just nagging. Let them know that hearing is something to value and that they should want to continue enjoying their entertainment (and more) for years to come.

Library to host annual Ekphrastic Poetry Festival

Submissions for the 2022 Ekphrastic Poetry Festival are underway by the Friendswood Library. Poems submitted will be considered for the 2022 Reading and Contest to be held at a later date.

An ekphrastic poem is defined by the Poetry Foundation as a vivid description of a scene or, more commonly, a work of art. Through the imaginative act of narrating and reflecting on the "action" of a painting or sculpture, the poet may amplify and expand its meaning.

One of the earliest examples is in Homer's the *Iliad* where he describes the Shield of Achilles. Another example is in *Ode on a Grecian Urn* by John Keats. The poet speculates the identity of the lovers who appear frozen in time on the urn dancing and playing music.

In the Friendswood contest, poets may submit one to three ekphrastic poems to Library Director Matt Riley at mriley@friendswood.com.

Poets should identify the specific work of art that each poem addresses.

All poems will be considered for a 2023 poetry anthology put together by the library. The contest will be judged by a blind jury. No self portrait artwork, names or contact information should be on the Word document with the poems.

Participants should type Ekphrastic Poetry in the subject line of their email and have their name, phone number, name of poem(s), names of artwork and artist and short bio in the body of the email.

Only works of art in the public domain or works of art where the poet is the copyright owner or can submit direct permission from the copyright owner will be considered for the contest and anthology.

The deadline for all submissions is July 31, 2022 at midnight.

When a team scores, it doesn't matter what inning they score the runs, just so long as they do it before the game is over.

Pearland and Katy split the first two games with the Lady Tigers winning Game One 3-2 and Pearland taking the second game 1-0 in the best-of-three series in the Class 6A Region III semifinals.

With a trip to the 6A Region III finals on the line, Katy (31-6) scored their four runs in the bottom of the first, third, and two in the fourth to take a 4-0 lead which stood until Pearland was down to their final three outs in the top of the seventh.

Just prior to the seventh inning and Pearland coming to bats, one of the announcers on the TexanLive.com coverage admittedly said, "This game is over."

However, no one told the Lady Oilers as they faced their final at bats in the game.

Junior outfielder Darrian DeLeon led off with a single to center and junior Hailey Golden followed with a bunt single.

Senior Alayna Calvillo then reached on a throwing error to load the bases.

Junior Kennedy Drafton belted a clutch two-run double to drive home a pair of runs for a 4-2 score.

Sophomore Raenna Liscano delivered another big blow, blasting a two-run single to center on an 0-2 pitch to tie the game at 4-4 with none out.

Junior Kristyn Whitlock then reached on an error before Katy finally recorded an out.

After junior Lydia Nyus grounded out for the second out, Pearland

sophomore Trinity Perry walked to load the bases.

Katy avoided further damage as a strikeout ended the inning with the game tied 4-4.

While the Pearland offense came up with the clutch runs, the Lady Oilers defense had to also step up to keep Katy from stealing a win in the last inning in regulation.

With two outs in the bottom of the seventh, Katy's Hailey Gore was gunned down at the plate for the final out sending the game to the eighth inning.

Pearland was unable to threaten in their half of the eighth. Once again, Katy had the potential winning run on base, but Lady Tiger Avery Porter was cut down at home in the eighth inning to keep Pearland's hopes alive.

It was in the tenth frame that Pearland exploded on offense with five runs to dash the hopes of Katy.

Golden started the 10th inning

with an infield single while Drafton, Liscano, Whitlock, Jordan Smith, Nyus, and Perry all had a hand in the five-run 10th frame.

With a 9-4 cushion, junior pitcher Abigail Gutierrez, who started in the circle, was taken out and then reinserted was able to withstand the final Katy challenge that left two Katy runners stranded when the final out of the game was made with the Lady Oilers prevailing 9-4.

Leading hitters for Pearland included Golden (3-for-6, 2 runs, 3 RBIs), Calvillo (3-for-6, 2 runs, 3 RBIs), Drafton (3-for-4, 2 runs, 3 RBIs, 3B), Liscano (3-for-5, 1 run, 3 RBIs), Whitlock (1-for-4, 1 run), Smith (2-for-4, 1 run, 1 RBI), Perry (1-for-4, 2 RBIs), and DeLeon (2-for-6, 1 run).

Friendswood wins best-of-three series over Crosby 12-0, 4-1

The No. 8 state-ranked Friendswood Mustangs easily took care of business over the Crosby Cougars in Game 1 of the best-of-three series with a 12-0 thrashing.

Friendswood exploded for 17 hits and 12 runs in Game 1 of the Class 5A Region III quarterfinals.

"It was basically one through nine," Friendswood coach Corey Benavides said. "Even the guy who didn't get a hit still squared the baseball up. It was good to see."

The run total was enough to support Mustang starting pitcher Jacob Rogers, who limited the Cougars to two hits in six innings of work. Rogers walked one and struck out seven.

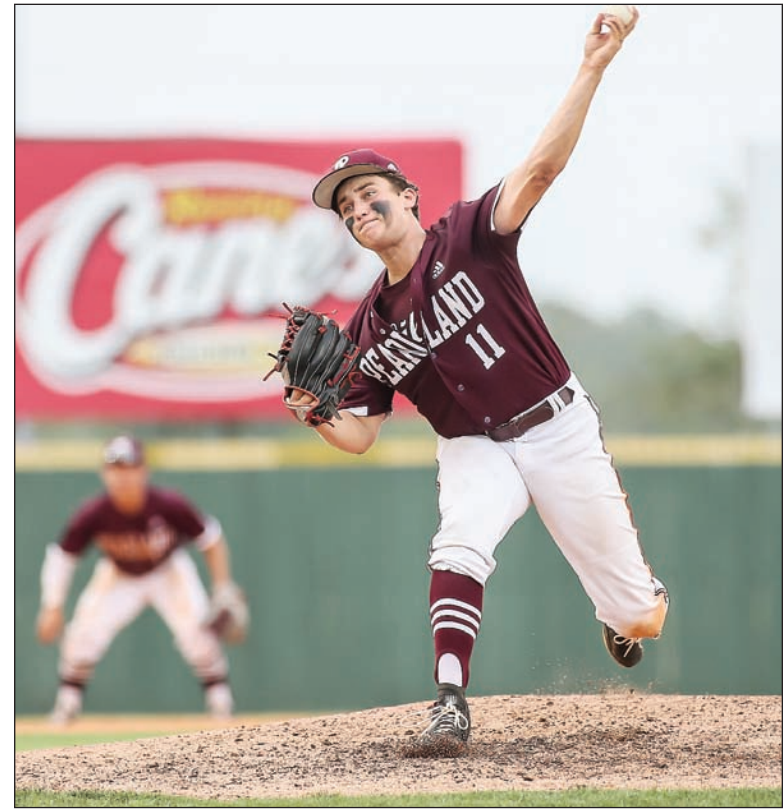

ON REMEMBERING

“This is the brand-new covenant that I will make with Israel when the time comes. I will put my law within them... write it on their hearts... and be their God! And they will be my people. They will no longer go around setting up schools to teach each other about GOD. They’ll know me firsthand, the dull and the bright, the smart and the slow. I’ll wipe the slate clean for each of them... and I’ll forget they ever sinned!”

~ Jeremiah 31:33-34

God is in the remembering business... never forgetting a thing... well... actually... can’t forget a thing as that’s the way God is. It comes with a cost and rightly should for the one who says, *“I’ve known everything about you... even before you were in your mother’s womb.”* How nice of God, huh? But again... that’s the way God is... a God who remembers because God is full of promises... like what we read in Exodus 2 when the people of Israel cried out in the midst of remaining slaves in Egypt... God listened to their groanings... God remembered the covenant with Abraham... and in that promise God delivered them from their bondage leading them to ‘the promised land.’
