KFB recognized as KTB Gold Star Affiliate

Keep Friendswood Beautiful has once again been recognized as a Keep Texas Beautiful 2022 Gold Star Affiliate.

To achieve Gold Star status, affiliates must share information

to Keep Texas Beautiful on their mission and goals, answer questions about their economic development and diversity and inclusion practices or participate in the Beautify Texas Awards or Governor's Community Achievement Awards programs

and provide a letter of support from their community.

Keep Friendswood Beautiful (KFB) is a city board made up of 20 volunteers dedicated to enhancing the aesthetic appearance of Friendswood and to encourage residents to take an active role in maintaining that appearance.

Activities in which KFB participate include picking up trash on their Adopt a Highway section in Friendswood, tending to the beautiful pollinator garden in Stevenson Park year round in all types of temperatures, organizing and participating in the giveaway of 100-plus trees to residents annually and volunteering at their City-wide clean up twice a year in Fall Haul and Spring Sparkle.

They brought the nationally-known Fairy Trail to Stevenson Park, Santa in the Park to the community and education community-wide with Figgy the Eco-Friendly Squirrel.

They also provide a matching beautification grant for HOAs or businesses annually.

Interested in getting your hands dirty and volunteering, a few volunteer spots for the KFB board are now available.

The history of Keep Texas Beautiful dates back to 1967, when Texas was preparing for the 1968 HemisFair in San Antonio and more than 16 million tourists were expected to descend upon the state.

A variety of representatives from diverse entities, including the State Department of High-

ways and Public Transportation, decided that Texas cities and highways should be given a "facelift" so visitors would see a clean, beautiful state. To accomplish this goal, the group created a non-profit educational corporation, supported totally by membership dues, known as the Beautify Texas Council.

Realizing the importance of what had been accomplished via local volunteers and their love of their communities, the Beautify Texas Council continued to support communities in their beautification efforts even after HemisFair. By 1968, the Council had supplied almost every Texas town with information on how to improve their city's appearance. In response to enthusiastic efforts from dedicated volunteers across the state, the Council eventually increased its focus to highway beautification, environmental education and public awareness, procurement and distribution of funding and support to local volunteers, and creating and maintaining valuable relationships with state officials and agencies.

In 1985, the Beautify Texas Council officially became Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., and a state affiliate of Keep America Beautiful. Since that time, KTB has won top honors as an outstanding KAB state affiliate and have grown by creating an extensive affiliate program.

Keep Texas Beautiful now has the largest environmental and community improvement network in the state.

Doyle was born in Galveston and raised in the Houston area. In middle school, he fell in love with two life-long pursuits: space and writing. He knew he wanted to work at NASA and write science fiction/fantasy on the side, and lo and behold, that's exactly what he ended up doing.

He graduated from Texas A&M University with a B.S. in Aerospace Engineering, and an M.S. in Systems Engineering. He now works for Barrios Technology as a project engineer for the next NASA space station, the Gateway, after previously working on commercial avionics, International Space Station (ISS) flight and manifest planning, and ISS research planning. He lives in the Houston area with his wife, daughters, and various small mammals.

His book is described as follows: Even gods have secrets...

rounded by an embargo, it gets even harder to survive.

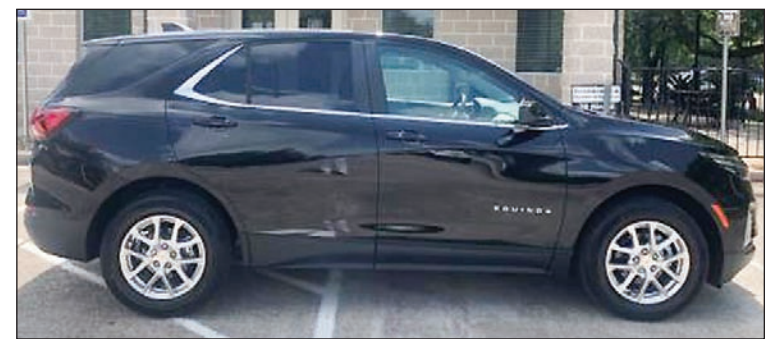
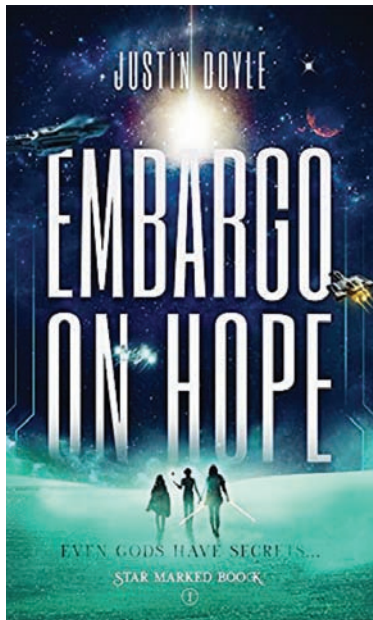

Galveston County enacts burn ban

Judge Mark Henry signed a burn ban June 14, 2022 to prohibit outdoor burning in the unincorporated parts of Galveston County.

Burn bans are enacted at the county level based on local drought, wind and other conditions, and the threat of wildfire. When enacted, they prohibit or restrict outdoor burning for public safety, including campfires and controlled burns.

The Texas Forest Service determined June 13 that drought conditions existed in the county as evidenced by the Keetch-Byram Drought Index (KBDD). With rates above 600 on the index after measuring moisture in the soil, the county is considered to be in severe drought and this means an increased fire risk.

County residents in unincorporated areas will not be able to burn trash or brush and campfires will not be allowed.

For any violations, the person committing the violation could face a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.



Alvin Community College reduce tuition for Alvin ISD Dual Enrollment students

Alvin ISD's Dual Enrollment program is a long-standing partnership between Alvin ISD and Alvin Community College. This program provides high school students the unique opportunity to obtain college credit while still in high school, which can lead to the completion of a postsecondary degree or certificate.

On May 17th, Alvin ISD was informed the Alvin Community College Board of Regents unanimously voted to support a request to reduce tuition for Alvin ISD students who take Dual Enrollment Classes either online or on campus at ACC.

Currently, Alvin ISD students who take classes outside of their respective high schools pay \$47 a credit hour and all fees associated with registration. The new proposal reduces the cost to \$25 per credit hour along with \$80 in fees, thus creating a savings of \$212 for a 3-credit course.

"We are committed to eliminating unintentional barriers to access to our Dual Enrollment program and recognize that cost can definitely be a barrier for some of our students and their families," shared Dr. Robert Exley, Alvin Community College President. "Our hope is that more students will be able to take courses as part of the Dual Enrollment program and that by providing more affordable options to take classes either online or after school hours on the ACC campus, it will enable more students to complete their Associates Degrees while in high school."

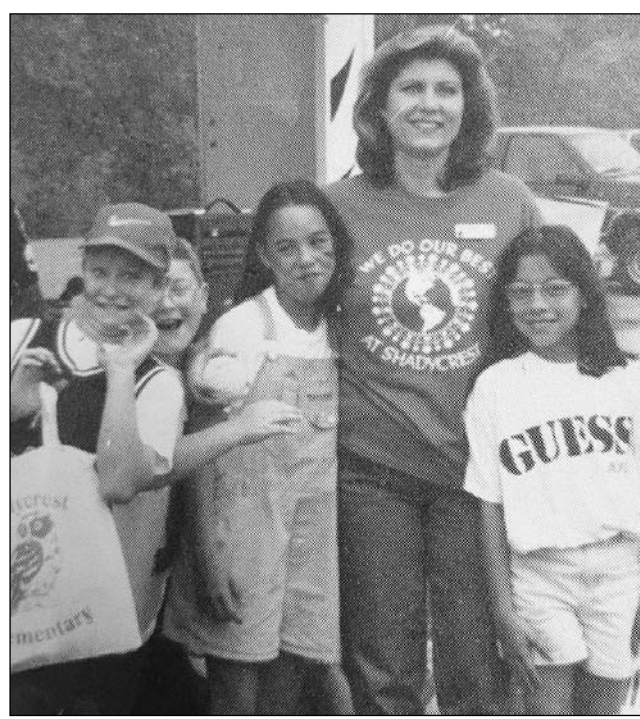
In 2022, Alvin ISD had 112 students graduate from ACC as part of the Dual Enrollment program. 91 of these students earned an Associate's of Arts Degree in General Studies and 21 received a Technical Degree. The General Studies degree is a combination of forty-two hours of core academic courses and eighteen hours of electives selected with the student's intended pathway in mind, for a total of sixty hours of college coursework completed prior to high school graduation.

"Alvin ISD is thankful for the Regents' decision. Hopefully with this new pricing structure, more Alvin ISD families will be able to take advantage of this amazing opportunity," shared Carol Nelson, Alvin ISD Superintendent. "Alvin ISD and ACC have always had a strong partnership and we look forward to continuing to offer these great opportunities to our students."

Dr. Waters Lauded as Trailblazer in Elementary Education after 39 years of service to Pearland ISD

As the 2021-22 school year comes to a close, Pearland Independent School District will bid farewell to longtime and cherished Senior Assistant Superintendent for Elementary Education, Dr. Brenda Waters, who is set to retire.

After dedicating 45 years to public education, 39 of those with the district, Dr. Waters thinks of Pearland as home. She began her journey in education in Friendswood and joined Pearland ISD in 1983 as a math teacher at Jamison Middle School because of the unique concept the district offered to fifth and sixth graders. "Not many districts followed this rare concept of an elementary and middle school, for me, giving students the extra support before transitioning was something I felt very strongly about." Growing up, Dr. Waters spent a lot of time helping other students in her neighborhood which is where the devoted servant leader first came to understand her true passion for education. "Teachers and students alike need hope, they need help. When you speak positivity into people's lives and tell them they will succeed, it shows," Dr. Waters said. "Parents are busier than they have ever been and it truly takes a village; Pearland ISD is that village." Dr. Waters believes in building character and has devoted a majority of her time to various programs and clubs as a teacher, among her favorites were Celebrity Readers, RISE Mentoring

and Math club, to name a few.

Following a decade of service in teaching, she accepted the role as assistant principal at Shadycrest Elementary where her daughter attended. In 1992, Dr. Waters went on to become the school's principal.

Dr. Waters also left her mark and led the way for future leaders. In 2002, she worked with architects to design Silvercrest Elementary, serving as Silvercrest's first principal. She was able to see the district grow and flourish from seven schools, an administration building and a transportation facility to 23 campuses, five facilities,

two transportation buildings, one agricultural and one maintenance & operations facility, as well as an Education Support Center.

In 2003, Dr. Waters joined the administration team as Executive Director of Elementary Schools. During her tenure, she not only helped to rebuild the foundation of elementary education for the district, but she also served the community alongside her peers after catastrophic events such as Hurricanes Rita, Ike, Harvey and, most recently, witnessed the biggest change in education her career has experienced with the Covid-19 pandemic.

The strides of progress that started with Dr. Waters will continue forward under the leadership of Marlo Keller. "Her legacy that began in August of 1983 will be carried on – a legacy that has now impacted thousands of students and families," Pearland ISD Superintendent Larry Berger said. "Her constant support and encouragement, her commitment to education and love for Pearland will truly be missed."

Dr. Waters' last day as Assistant Superintendent for Elementary Schools is set for the end of June. She looks forward to spending time with family and returning to the classroom, this time, walking the halls as a volunteer to continue serving her beloved district.

NATIVE AMERICAN WISDOM

(Last in a series of four posts)

“See, I have taught you decrees and laws as the LORD my God commanded me, so that you may follow them in the land you are entering to take possession of it. Observe them carefully, for this will show your wisdom and understanding to the nations, who will hear about all these decrees and say, “Surely this great nation is a wise and understanding people.”

- Deuteronomy 4:5-6

The word, ‘wisdom’ appears in both the Old and New Testaments of the Bible... and is presented in the female form. Bam. So... take that all ye men of good will and faith... thinking women and children are to be seen and not heard... as the ‘wise old man’ down the block is outdueled by the ‘wiser woman’ next door... or in my case the one who lives in my house... as though I’m a pretty good guy... give credit to my wife... she’s made me a better man than I thought I’d ever be.

And speaking of the Bible... here’s a very interesting thought on how I think the Bible gets read in our culture... one way having a posture or thought and then go looking for a verse in the Bible to back that idea up... or the other way... the one I’ve used for most of my adult life... to read the Bible... out loud even ... and listen to what is being heard... then respond to that... or simply said... the first way is to read into the scriptures and the second is allow the scriptures to read out to us... the latter having greater positive consequence and the former potentially being very dangerous... as when I read this passage from Deuteronomy it is easy to see how those who arrived from Europe could use these words as permission from God to usurp the land already inhabited by some of God’s own... despite the differences from the ones arriving! And in the big scheme of things as much as there is plenty of ancient native American wisdom to consider there are modern thoughts of those who still claim those indigenous ways... like this...

“We are strong, resilient, and highly adaptable people. Archaeology shows that

Alaska native peoples have been here for 14,500 years and more. Our ancestors lived through climate issues of the past so we know that we will survive the hardships coming our way, but it will not be easy.” - Rose Highbear (02/2015)

She sounds a bit prophetic. And just like the obvious diversity in the USA of our day... we hear this... “across this great country, from the southwest to the northeast, one cannot paint Indian country with a single stroke. Indian country is not a homogeneous community. There are some stark and subtle differences that make each tribe unique” -Tara McLean Sweeny (05/2018)

Or these words from Dorothy Haberman about the importance of embracing the best of one’s past yet understanding life is full of shifts and turns... “we have to look at the way we were in the past, hang on to it in our hearts and at the same time change; accepting we’re always changing to survive.”

And there is this piece of Cherokee wisdom lifted up in 2020 by Lisa Pivec... “We have to come together as one people. We have to think about others. And that’s something the Cherokee do. And that’s how we live collectively...understanding that what we do and how we live impacts others. Don’t ask. ‘What are my rights? Ask, what are my responsibilities?’”

And this... some hail the interactions of Jesuit missionaries with native Americans over time... contributed to the ending of France’s aristocracy!

So, if wisdom is a gift of God... then we will find it in many places and in many people... and hopefully even within ourselves... and better yet... that others would find some in us... or as Ernestine Hayes declared, “Well, we’re still here!”

David Rogers deservedly named him the 23-6A "Coach of the Year."

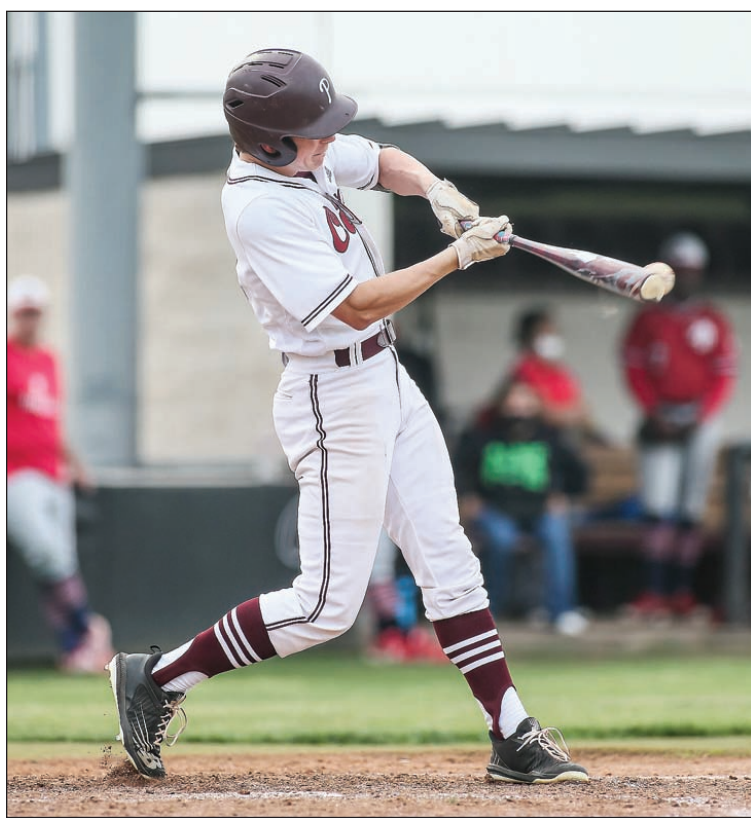
