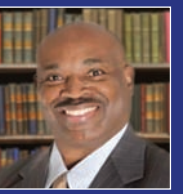

Former Marine steps down as Grand Marshal amid threats

Former Marine and Friendswood High School alum Haley Carter has voluntarily resigned as Grand Marshal of this year's 4th of July parade.

According to the Friendswood Parks & Recreation Department, Carter "stepped down after receiving threats of harm to herself and her family."

The ordeal began last Wednesday shortly after the City publicized that Carter had been chosen to fill the ceremonial role, a decision that had been made by the 4th of July Steering Committee several months prior. "We are proud to announce Haley Carter as this year's Grand Marshal for the 4th of July parade" read the official release on Facebook.

A former Marine and professional soccer player, Carter has all the makings of an ideal candidate, however, Friendswood resident and conservative radio host Jesse Kelly took exception to her appointment. Originally from Arizona, Kelly moved to Friendswood in December 2020.

Kelly took to Twitter, claiming "Communists are in blood red areas too. They just chose Haley Carter to be Grand Marshal of the July 4th Parade. She's a gun-grabber. She's into drag. She's into trans activism." The tweet included a picture of Carter's son taken from one of her social media posts. He then posted the City phone number with a message to his thousands of followers: "Let them know."

City staff were quickly inundated with calls.

As chair of the City of Houston's Commission Against Gun Violence, Carter has advocated for "sensible gun control and violence reduction policies." Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner, who appointed Carter to the commission, released a statement saying he was "deeply saddened to hear and see many of the comments expressed after [Haley Carter] was announced Friendswood's 4th of July Parade Grand Marshal [sic]."

On Thursday morning, a little more than 24 hours from the initial post, the City of Friendswood announced Carter had decided to step down. "There will be no replacement Grand Marshal" said the post.

The countdown has begun for the Fourth of July festivities on Monday, July 4 in Friendswood.

Here are some Frequently Asked Questions for the 4th of July programs.

Q: Will there be food vendors at the Centennial Park event?

A: Yes, The Parks Dept. has expanded their food court this year with a variety of choices from BBQ to Kettle Korn.

Q: What time does the evening event start?

A: The event begins at 7:30 pm. The shuttle buses start rolling at 6:30 pm from the Methodist Church and Friendswood High School. Buses roll until 8:45 pm, stop for the fireworks and immediately start transporting attendees back to the parking locations once the fireworks end.

Q: Can we bring in snacks and coolers?

A: Yes, and if riding shuttles make sure the cooler is small enough to fit on your lap. No glass containers are allowed.

Q: May we bring in chairs on the shuttle?

A: Yes

Q: May I bring my dog on the shuttle?

A: No, but dog are allowed to walk in as long as they are on a leash.

Q: May we walk into the park from FM 518

or Falcon Ridge?

A: Absolutely but please be cautious of vehicles.

Q: Will the amusement rides be at the evening program?

A: There will no longer be amusement rides at the evening program.



Q: Will there be detours due to the morning parade?

A: Friendswood Dr. will be shut down in both directions from 9:50 - 11 am on Monday, July 4, 2022 for the annual 4th of July Parade. Use

Sunset Dr. or Blackhawk Blvd. as alternate routes.

Q: Will Centennial Park be closed for set up?

A: For the safety of residents during preparation and clean-up of the July 4th Concert and Fireworks, Centennial Park (2200 South Friendswood Drive), will be closed, June 27th thru Friday, July 8th, except for the July 4th evening activities.

Q: Will there be a bike parade on July 4 and who can enter?

A: Children are invited to participate in the 4th of July parade's decorated bicycle contest. Parents of the child who wants to enter their decorated bike into the parade need to bring them and their decorated bike to Comerica Bank parking lot at 203 S. Friendswood Dr. by 9 am for judging. Trophies and medals will be awarded to the best in each age category.

Categories include Ages 7 and under; Ages 8-11; and Ages 12 and older. No parade application is required just show up. Parade winners for each category will be announced at the gazebo in Stevenson Park at noon on July 4.

But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh; rather, serve each other humbly in love. 14 For the entire law is fulfilled in keeping this one command: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' 15 If you bite and devour each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other." - Galatians 5:13-15

I'm writing these words from Amherst, MA and by the time you read them I will be back in Pearland prepping my family's fourth of July celebration... as Amherst is home to both Amherst College (founded in 1821 with a 'mammoth' for its mascot on a mammoth skeleton has been on campus since the 1920's) and UMass (founded in 1863 with a mascot name 'minutemen'... those who readied themselves in a moment's notice back in the 1770's)... one a private college and the other funded by public dollars... and it is noteworthy to report people were living in this part of the country as early as the 1730's only reminding us education and patriotism run pretty deep around here...

Beginning Thursday, July 21, the Galveston County Tax Office will implement new hours of operation as follows:

- Monday – Thursday 7:30 am to 5:30 pm
- Friday 8:00 am to Noon

Friendswood Satellite hours Thursdays will also be 7:30 am to 5:30 pm (closed Noon to 1 for lunch) and Friday from 8:00 am to Noon. Crystal Beach will continue to open the 3rd Tuesday of each month from 7:30 am to 4:30 pm (closed 30 minutes for lunch from 11:30-Noon).

Most services continue to be available online 24/7 at www.galcotax.com.

Customers are encouraged to utilize drop-boxes (yellow at full time locations and black at rear driveway of Friendswood City Hall). All items left in drop-boxes are picked up daily at 8:30 am and processed with the previous business day effective date.

Volunteer Deputy Registrar training will continue to be conducted the 3rd Friday of each month with class beginning at 10:00 am. Registration is not required but is preferred in order for VDR packets to be prepared in advance. Contact a Voter Registration Specialist at (409) 766-2280 or toll free (888) 976-2280.

City of Pearland offers Home Repair Program

The City of Pearland is committed to maintaining healthy and vibrant neighborhoods for all residents. Instrumental in achieving this critical goal is the use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

A portion of CDBG funds is used towards the City's Home Repair Program. This program is designed to assist eligible low-moderate income Pearland homeowners that occupy their homes, for needed minor repairs to their homes.

The Home Repair Program is a federal based program through Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and requires no cost from Pearland homeowners. Although the program requires no upfront cost from Pearland homeowners, a forgivable five-year lien will be placed on the property for the cost of repairs. This lien will lessen over the course of five years and will be forgiven at the end of that time.

Applicants are not required to pay back any monetary expenses for the total cost of repairs. The Home Repair Program follows many set Federal and City guidelines for applicant and property eligibility such as, Ownership, Occupancy, Income Limitations, Location and Type of Structure.

The Home Repair Program provides minor home repairs that prevent hazardous health conditions, and deterioration which include but not limited to Electrical, Plumbing, Drywall, HVAC, Roofing, Siding, Doors and Windows, etc.

Each home repair is unique to the given circumstances and can vary in length based on the application status, review of information, and scope of work. The staff member assigned to you will provide timely status updates for your specific circumstance. The general construction period usually takes 1-3 business days.

If one is a current resident of Pearland and are interested in the Home Repair Program, visit homerepairs@pearlandtx.gov and complete an interest form. Contact will be made by the City's Housing Rehabilitation Officer within 48 business hours to discuss program eligibility and next steps.

Down to the last string

The colorful, nineteenth-century showman and gifted violinist Nicolo Paganini was standing before a packed house playing through a difficult piece of music. A full orchestra surrounded him with magnificent support. Suddenly one string on his violin snapped and hung gloriously down from his instrument. Beads of perspiration popped out on his forehead. He frowned but continued to play - improvising beautifully.

To the conductor's surprise, a second string broke. And shortly thereafter, a third. Now there were three limp strings dangling from Paganini's violin as the master performer completed the difficult composition on the one remaining string.

The audience jumped to its feet and in good Italian fashion, filled the hall with shouts and screams - "Bravo! Bravo!" As the applause died down, the violinist asked the people to sit back down. Even though they knew there was no way they could expect an encore, they quietly sank back into their seats.

He held the violin high for everyone to see. He nodded at the conductor to begin the encore and then he turned back to the crowd, and with a twinkle in his eye, he smiled and shouted - "Paganini and one string!" After that he placed the single-stringed Stradivarius beneath his chin and played the final piece on one string as the audience (and the conductor) shook their heads in silent amazement. "Paganini and one string!" And, I might add, an attitude of fortitude.

I believe the single most significant decision I can make on a day-to-day basis is my choice of attitude. It is more important than my past, my education, my successes or failures, fame or pain, what other people think of me or say about me, my circumstances, or my position.

Attitude is that "single string" that keeps me going or cripples my progress. It alone fuels my fire or assaults my hope. When my attitudes are right - there is no barrier too high - no valley too deep - no dream too extreme - no challenge too great for me.

Yet we must admit that we spend more of our time concentrating and fretting over the strings that snap - dangle - and pop - the things that can't be changed - than we do giving attention to the one string that remains - our choice of attitude.

Your attitude can make or break your family. If you consistently have a negative attitude toward your mate or children - don't be surprised when those attitudes become the dominant tone of your environment.

But when your strings snap and you only have one left - play like crazy to produce a beautiful symphony of music that will pulsate a melody that encourages and excites others to new heights of existence.

So, when the strings of life snap and you are down to one - hold up that one string and scream out, "(Your Name) and one string!"

Old friend Robert said, "When we hear what God has done with others, it inspires us and expands our hearts with greater faith, vision, and purpose."

Shadow Creek a pre-season favorite to win 23-6A title

Ever since Shadow Creek began competing at the varsity level in their young history, first in Class 5A where they won a 5A state championship, and now, as a Class 6A state power, the Sharks have always been considered a top pre-season pick to capture a district title and to go deep in the post-season.

The Sharks finished in second place behind the Dawson Eagles in 2020 and won the league title in 2021 with a 7-0 mark to finish ahead of Pearland (6-1), Dawson (5-2), and Alief Taylor (4-3).

Shadow Creek is a pre-season pick to capture the league crown again followed by Dawson, Pearland, Strake Jesuit, Alief Taylor, Alvin, Alief Hastings, and Alief Elsik.

Head coach Brad Butler saw his team post a 9-3 mark in 2021 while advancing to the area round in the playoffs. The Sharks began last season with a 1-2 non-district record as they lost to North Shore (33-11) and Bridgeland (24-14) before getting past Cypress Woods (28-11).

After running the table in district action, the Sharks won their bi-district playoff contest over Clear Creek (45-38) before seeing their season end in the area-round to C.E. King (52-34).

The 2022 football season presents another challenging non-district schedule as the Sharks will face district cousin Manvel in the

season opener on Friday, August 26 at Freedom Field at 7:00 p.m. The Mavericks are picked to win their 10-5A DI district and are a pre-season No. 8 state-ranked team. The Mavs were 10-3 last season while advancing to the 5A Region III DI finals.

Next on the schedule will be District 24-6A power Clear Springs who was 7-5 last season while advancing to the area round.

The final non-district opponent will be a re-match from last year with Bridgeland. The Sharks will be looking to avenge last year's loss to the Bears who were 11-3 in

2021 with a trip to the 6A Region III finals.

Shadow Creek will return an experienced team for the 2022 season with six offensive and seven defensive starters while drawing from a pool of 39 returning lettermen to fill the other positions.

The offense will be led with the return of quarterback Duke Butler (6-1, 175, 4.5) who threw for 1,922 yards and 29 TDs. He also had a QB rating of 111.0 while averaging 13.4 yards per completion. Butler had 207 yards rushing on 90 carries and two TDs.

Joining Butler in the backfield is

junior RB Tylik Burton (5-9, 170, 4.7) who rushed for 760 yards and 8 TDs as a sophomore.

Others on offense who will have an impact for the Sharks include WR/ATH Jacob Washington (6-1, 180, 4.6), WR Jacorey Watson (6-0, 165, 4.5), WR Josh Best, WR Caleb Washington RB Felix Buchanan, OL Tyson Kestner, and OL Marcis Kemp.

The strength for the Sharks will be their defense with seven returning starters who are all college prospects at the FBS level.

The defense will be led by defensive ends Theorin Randall (6-2, 265, 4.9) and Zion Taylor (6-2, 230, 4.8). Last year, Randall recorded 42 tackles and 5 sacks while Taylor had 18 tackles and 4 sacks.

LB Robert Edmonson (6-1, 200, 4.7) led the defense with 72 stops, 3 sacks, and 1 INT. Junior DB Maurice Williams (6-2, 185, 4.5) had 47 tackles and 1 INT while garnering double digit offers at the next level.

Additional defensive players include junior LB Ethan Judge (5-11, 180, 4.8), LB Sean Gilbert, LB Scott Koumado, and DB Zyran King-Brooks.

While Shadow Creek is a pre-season favorite to win the league title, there will be several other teams in the district that will put them to the test including Dawson and Pearland that will have something to say regarding the outcome of the district race.

City of Pearland offers Home Repair Program

The City of Pearland is committed to maintaining healthy and vibrant neighborhoods for all residents. Instrumental in achieving this critical goal is the use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

A portion of CDBG funds is used towards the City's Home Repair Program. This program is designed to assist eligible low-moderate income Pearland homeowners that occupy their homes, for needed minor repairs to their homes.

The Home Repair Program is a federal based program through Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and requires no cost from Pearland homeowners. Although the program requires no upfront cost from Pearland homeowners, a forgivable five-year lien will be placed on the property for the cost of repairs. This lien will lessen over the course of five years and will be forgiven at the end of that time.

Applicants are not required to pay back any monetary expenses for the total cost of repairs. The Home Repair Program follows many set Federal and City guidelines for applicant and property eligibility such as, Ownership, Occupancy, Income Limitations, Location and Type of Structure.

The Home Repair Program provides minor home repairs that prevent hazardous health conditions, and deterioration which include but not limited to Electrical, Plumbing, Drywall, HVAC, Roofing, Siding, Doors and Windows, etc.

Each home repair is unique to the given circumstances and can vary in length based on the application status, review of information, and scope of work. The staff member assigned to you will provide timely status updates for your specific circumstance. The general construction period usually takes 1-3 business days.

If one is a current resident of Pearland and are interested in the Home Repair Program, visit homerepairs@pearlandtx.gov and complete an interest form. Contact will be made by the City's Housing Rehabilitation Officer within 48 business hours to discuss program eligibility and next steps.
