The awards were presented at the recent FISD School Board meeting.

Friendswood School Board approves tax rate change

On Monday night the Friendswood ISD School Board unanimously approved a new tax rate of \$1.2094, a decrease of 3 cents from the previous rate.

As part of HB 3, the Texas Legislature compressed tax rates for school districts resulting in a \$0.0174 decrease in the Maintenance & Operations tax rate which accounts for the majority of the tax rate at \$0.9170.

The remaining \$0.2924 tax rate is applied to the Interest & Sinking fund which covers the interest costs on the recent construction bonds.

Despite the reduced tax rate, the school district projects they will

collect an additional \$2 million in revenue over last year. The increase is due in large part to the explosive growth in appraised property values. In the past year alone, taxable home values in Friendswood have risen an average of 10.39%.

The new tax rate applied to a home

worth \$300,000 would result in a tax bill of \$3,628.20. Taxpayers can reduce their bill if they have a



Get your feet wet and your hands dirty? Spend time in a natural setting? Learn about different plant and animal species? Present, instruct, and teach youth or adults? Enhance our natural resources: build, dig, plant, count, band, identify and observe?

Learn about and experience our local ecosystems firsthand. Learn interesting facts about the ecosystems in your own back yard.

The Texas Master Naturalist Cradle of Texas Chapter of Brazoria County is made up of members from all walks of life with various levels of education that have a passion to learn and share their knowledge with others. Brazoria County Chapter of the Texas Master Naturalist is seeking men and women interested in becoming a Texas Master Naturalist.

"I was pleasantly surprised at the high level of knowledge and expertise of the instructors leading the various training sessions. The quality of the training far exceeded my expectations," recent intern Kyle Purvis said.

Intern Kathy Pittman agrees.

"I've always had a love of the outdoors, but this class gives you a greater understanding of our local environs and the interactions between organisms and their habitat. You learn so much!" "I have met some of the most knowledgeable people, with similar interests, and am thoroughly enjoying my work as a Master Naturalist!" Pittman said.

Relationships to the environment are studied.

"The classes, field trips, interactions with subject matter experts and our group projects opened the curtains to show how intertwined and fragile the relationships between wildlife, the environment, and humans really are," Melanie Hollenshead said.

The Cradle of Texas Chapter of Brazoria County is offering a fall intern class which begins on August 23. Classes and field trips will meet in person every Tuesday. No virtual instruction.

Classroom instruction begins at 9 am and field trips begin shortly afterward.

Field Trips will be at locations such as Brazoria National Wildlife Refuge, Brazos Bend State Park, and Sea Center Texas

DFNC begins new Texas Horned Lizard program

The Delores Fenwick Nature Center (DFNC) is now home to 12 Texas Horned Lizards. The six pairs of lizards were brought to Pearland from West Texas in June by Pearland Parks & Recreation Department Natural Resources Manager, Cullen Ondracek.

What started out just as a conversation with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) about a year and a half ago turned into a reality June 2022. The

DFNC plans to help protect this native wildlife species through captive breeding in hopes of reestablishing populations where they once were not too long ago.

"We are doing this good work to add back to the Texas Horned Lizards numbers each year," Ondracek said. "I have heard countless stories of childhood memories from folks who remember seeing them in their backyard growing up. They have disappeared from the eastern part of the state now, but they used to be here too."

The DFNC staff plans to place all captive produced eggs in an incubator, then transition the hatched lizards to aquarium tanks

> where they will stay for 1-3 months before going back to the wild at TPWD release sites.

> Every year the pairings will rotate for better genetic diversity. The DFNC will keep the

original 12 adult lizards for as long as they live to continuously aid in conservation efforts with each new group of eggs.

The lizards are currently not available for public viewing just yet while they adjust to their new home and captive breeding, but the DFNC hopes to open them to the public in the future for even more educational opportunities.

Why Wales? Well, one member of our club made direct contact with a Welsh Rotary club in northern Wales during her recent family visit there. As a result of that contact, and her first hand account of the situation, we were introduced via Zoom to members of the Welsh club, and to representatives of Link International ("Link"), a locally connected charitable organization that is involved in accommodation of Ukrainian refugees in Wales.

How can we support the refugees in Wales? Under our club President's direction, we formed a team to determine what we could do to support the Welsh club and the Ukrainian refugees in the area. First, we determined that the Ukrainian refugee situation is a long term situation. The war in Ukraine is still underway, and many refugees' homes and cities were destroyed by the Russians. Rebuilding in Ukraine will be a long term proposition, and the refugees may not be able to return for years. Second, because our member was in Wales, she was best equipped not only to lead the team, but also to maintain communication with the Welsh club, Link, the Welsh government, and other groups involved in the situation. She has done an admirable job gaining the trust of the other groups, and representing our club to them as a service organization.

Our team leader has been a prime mover in determining how our club can best provide support for the refugees. She observed first hand how the culture in Wales is much different from ours in Texas. As a result, she has a good understanding of how we can best work with the Welsh. For example, she was able to identify specific activities that our club could support financially. After some discussion, our Friendswood club provided financial support for two specific activities to help the refugees. Our support was funneled through Link as a charitable organization, and were much appreciated.

Our team's leader continues to build and maintain relationships with the Welsh groups involved. Our team's primary focus is to determine what needs to be done and what can be done by our club. We know that the potential needs are great, but we want to be good stewards of our money, and any donations we receive to assist the refugees.

For how long? This question cannot be answered at this time, but it will take some time, perhaps many years, for the refugees to return to their homeland. Some of them may never return, especially the children as they are educated in Wales, speaking both English and Welsh. The Rotary Club of Friendswood, through its charitable foundation, will provide support for the Ukrainian refugees as long as specific needs can be identified and quantified. We hope to gain support throughout Friendswood and our local area to ensure that the needs are met.

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ARTIST PAULA GRON

Artists collaborate on 'Counterparts' exhibition in UHCL Art Gallery

Paula and Jack Gron, both lifelong artists who happen to be married to each other, work in completely different media. Paula's art reflects her need to have "busy, busy hands," using sewn, quilted and assembled textile techniques that are inspired by nature and color. Jack's work is in metal and wood and is an expression of the full range of his emotions.

Together, they have chosen about 40 pieces and combined them for an exhibition entitled "Counterparts," to open on Sept. 6 at University of Houston-Clear Lake's Art Gallery, located in the Bayou Building.

"We are counterparts. We are part of the same machine," said Paula. "We complement each other, but our work is not similar. I draw my inspiration from the outside world; from nature and life forms. Jack draws his inspiration from within, so he's expressing himself emotionally in his sculptures."

Paula, a former commercial graphic artist, said she has always loved crocheting, weaving and sewing, and her work often depicts seeds released from pods. "I am trying to raise awareness about vanishing flora and fauna in the world," she said. "I've learned from local botanists, the Millennium Seed Bank in Sussex, England and use the IUCN RedList of endangered plants."

Jack, a retired art professor, said he'd been creating art as well as teaching college students his entire career. "I taught metals-welding, forging, bronze, aluminum, stainless steel," he said. "My work has taken me all over the world, but when the pandemic hit, I was cloistered in my studio with no place to go. I decided to use up the materials I had in my studio and work intuitively. I let the work dictate to me how it should be."

He decided to reincorporate wood into his work, combining it with metals. "I find that interesting; the surfaces, textures and reflections," he said. "I always work with what the piece is telling me. It changes as the work evolves. I allow for spontaneity to occur in the work, so if I see something happening that I didn't account for in the sketch, I allow for that."

He said that the highlight of his works in the exhibition was a piece called "Bridges," a combination of stainless steel, aluminum and wood. "It's very striking and everything else is built around it," he said. "I've done several pieces called 'Bridges' in my career. It's about connecting one thing to another, or going from one place to another via this structure."

Paula said that of all the pieces in her part of the exhibition, she hoped people would note the herbarium data sheet triptych. "Scientists very carefully tape gathered, dried plants with seeds in bags onto archival paper along with the data about where that plant was found, including its dimensions and its vulnerability," she said. "My artistic interpretation is that I wanted to duplicate that on canvas, make the floral part 3D and add a quilting element to it. "Counterparts" is Jack's first exhibition to feature hardwood to add contrast of surface, texture and color. Paula said her work is primarily a commentary on worldwide human and industrial impacts that affect the extinction rates of plant life. The exhibition will run through Oct. 21.
