FISD board approves 2023-2024 participation, academic fees

Friendswood ISD Board of Trustees unanimously approved the 2023-2024 Participation Fees Schedule as well as Academic fees for both the high school and junior high students at their regularly scheduled meeting in April. The upcoming year fees include no changes from the prior year's approved amounts.

FISD charges fees for partici-

pation in UIL sports and Speech/Debate at Friendswood High School and Friendswood Junior High. Participation fees are used as revenue to offset costs of expenditures for stipends, referees, judges, travel, fees for entry, equipment, and materials.

Currently, fees are split into Tier 1 (\$150 for HS/\$75 for JH) or Tier 2 (\$100 for HS/ \$50 for JH) with Tier 1 being a higher fee amount for most activities, such

as: band, baseball, basketball, football, golf, soccer, softball, speech/debate, swimming, tennis, track, volleyball, and water polo.

Tier 2 includes drill team, cross-country, varsity cheerleading, and wrestling.

There is a maximum for each child and each family. The maximum for high school is \$150 per student with \$75 per student for the junior high. The maximum per family is \$300.

These fees are recorded to revenues in the general fund.

In the 2022-23 fiscal year, the FISD collected approximately \$156,000 in participation fees, which is slightly less than previous years.

School Board members also approved unanimously the 2023-2024 Academic related fee statement amounts for both FHS and FJH.

At FHS, students pay \$20 for a physical education uniform that becomes the property of the student; \$5 for their student ID which is in a set of two and becomes their property; \$15 for PSAT for junior and sophomore students only; \$5 for a College, Career, Military Readiness (CCMR) online portfolio; and an optional \$40 for parking.

PSAT/NMSQT measures readiness for college, access

scholarships, and supports feedback on the skills and knowledge that matter most for success on the SAT.

Regarding the CCMR, each student will have their own online CCMR portfolio housed in a comprehensive system used by students to align their strengths and interests to post-secondary goals.

All students enrolled in math, grades 9 – 12, will be required to have at their disposal a TI 84 or equivalent graphing calculator.

At FJH, academic fees refer to the following: \$10 PSAT 8/9 for 8th grade students only and \$5 CCMR online portfolio. The PSAT 8/9 supports all students with early feedback on the skills and knowledge that matter most for college and career readiness and success. Regarding CCMR, each student will have their own online CCMR portfolio housed in a comprehensive system used by students to align their strengths and interests to post-secondary goals.

All students enrolled in Pre-Algebra, Algebra and Geometry will be required to have at their disposal a TI 84+ or equivalent graphing calculator.

There were no proposed changes to fee amounts for the 2023-2024 High School and Junior High Academic Fee Statements.

Lady Oilers capture 23-6A softball crown with win over Dawson

Pearland and Dawson entered their second-round district showdown tied for the top spot in the 23-6A standings at 8-1. The Lady Oilers (25-3) entered the contest ranked No. 7 in the state while Dawson (22-5) was ranked No. 16 in the state.

The Lady Oilers were nipped by the Lady Eagles 3-2 in the first round while playing without three key starters. Dawson suffered their only district loss to third-place Alvin 7-1 to place the two Pearland squads in a tie for first-place.

Both teams knew that the winner of this showdown would emerge as the league champion as Pearland only had two district games remaining on the schedule and those were against Alief Taylor and Alief Hastings.

Pearland took care of Alief Taylor 15-0 which secured the district title and a win over Alief Hastings will officially seal the district crown.

The Lady Eagles will be playing for second or third place against the Lady Jackets after a win over Alief Elsik. Dawson will host Alvin on Friday, April 21 at 7:00 p.m.

PEARLAND 7 - DAWSON 4

Tied for the district lead for most of the season, Pearland and Dawson entered the second round tied with an 8-1 league mark. The winner of this game would more than likely secure the district crown.

It didn't take long for Dawson to strike as the Lady Eagles got back-to-back two-out solo home runs from Sa'Mya Jones over the right field fence and Makenzie Wright over the left field wall for a 2-0 lead.

The Lady Oilers answered with a run in the bottom of the first when sophomore Kaylee Schweitzer laced a single to centerfield, advanced to second on a ground out and scored on a two-out single by Kristyn Whitlock making the score 2-1.

Pearland would take the lead in the third frame scoring three runs for a 4-2 advantage.

Schweitzer would drill a one-out single to right field,

advance to second on a walk to Kennedy Drafton. Whitlock would single to centerfield to plate Schweitzer to tie the game at 2-2.

Raenna Liscano would line out to the Dawson pitcher for the second out, but Lydia Njus would hit a clutch hit to centerfield to bring home Whitlock and Drafton for a 4-2 lead.

Dawson would score a run in the top of the fourth and fifth frames to tie the game at 4-4.

Jones scored in the fourth on a fielder's choice and the Lady Eagles reached in their home run bag as Jenna Theford smashed a homer over the centerfield wall to knot up the game 4-4.

The Lady Oilers would take the lead for good in the bottom of the fifth with two runs as Liscano singled to centerfield to plate Drafton who had reached base via a fielder's choice to make the score 5-4. After Trinity Perry is hit by a pitch Kelsey Martin smashes a single to centerfield to score Mann for a 6-4 advantage.

Pearland would add an insurance run in the sixth when Hailey Golden singled to centerfield and scored on a triple by Drafton to post the 7-4 final score and secure the district championship.

Senior Abigail Gutierrez got the win in the pitching circle for Pearland as she gave up four runs on four hits with 10 strikeouts and two walks in five frames. Junior Carly Carpenter pitched two innings and surrendered one hit, no runs, struck out one and walked one.

Dawson senior Gigi Solis took loss as she pitched six innings and gave up 12 hits, seven runs, two strikeouts and two walks.

Leading hitters for the Lady Eagles was Jones (2-for-3, 2 runs, 1 RBI, 1HR), Wright (2-for-2, 1 run, 1 RBI, 1HR), and Theford (1-for-3, 1run, 1RBI, 1HR).

Leading hitters for the Lady Oilers was Golden (1-for-4, 1 run), Schweitzer (2-for-3, 2 runs), Drafton (1-for-3, 2 runs, 1 RBI), Whitlock (3-for-4, 1 run, 2 RBIs), Liscano (1-for-3, 1 RBI), Njus (1-for-2, 2 RBIs), and Martin (1-for-2, 1 RBI).

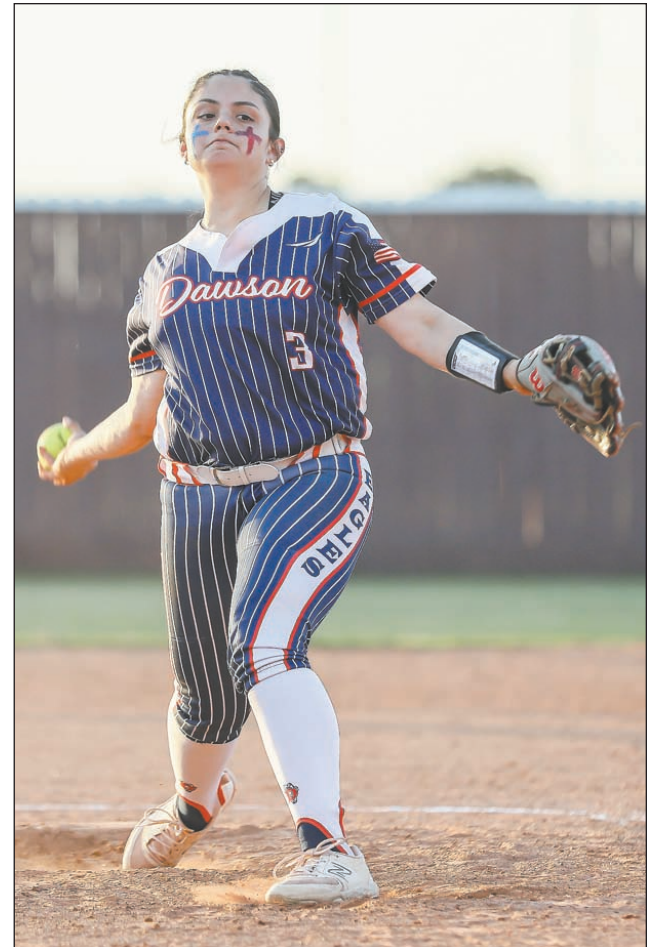

La Porte splits district games with Friendswood

Friendswood was the No. 1 Class 5A state-ranked team last week until La Porte edged the Mustangs 5-4 after Friendswood beat the Bulldogs 6-1 on Tuesday to split the district games and drop the Mustangs to No. 4 in the state polls.

Friendswood is now 21-3 (9-1) and fell behind to No. 1 Whitehouse (23-3), Corpus Christi Ray (25-3), and Grapevine (21-4).

In the Tuesday game, Friendswood scored twice in the first inning and four times in the third to get the district win.

In the first inning, Peyton Adams doubled to right-center, Boots Landry smashed a ball to left-center, and Collin Goolsby blasted a triple in the gap to right to give the Mustangs a 2-1 lead.

In the third frame, walks to Adams, Landry and Ayden

Pearcy loaded the bases. Goolsby then stroked a two-run single to left-center and Dane Perry followed with a two-run double to right-center for a 6-1 Mustang lead.

That was more than enough cushion for Friendswood pitcher Easton Tumis, who worked 5 2/3 innings, allowing both La Porte runs while striking out nine.

LA PORTE 5 - FRIENDSWOOD 4

Friendswood jumped out to a 4-0 lead against the La Porte Bulldogs, but uncharacteristic mistakes cost the No. 1 state-ranked Mustangs its first district loss and just the third loss overall on the season.

The Mustangs built a 4-0 advantage with a run-scoring error in the top of the first, an RBI double from Dawson Hinson and another run-scoring error in the top of the second, and a leadoff solo home run from Boots Landry in the top of the third.

But, the game came unraveled for Friendswood in the Bulldogs' five-run bottom of the fifth inning with a hit batter and an error setting the stage for their first run to score on a wild pitch and a second to score on an RBI single.

Following a walk, La Porte tied it on a two-run single before another walk and a wild pitch allowed the go-ahead run to score.

Leading hitters for Friendswood were Hinson (2-for-2, one RBI, one run, double), Landry (2-for-4, one RBI, one run, home run) and Collin Goolsby (2-for-4).

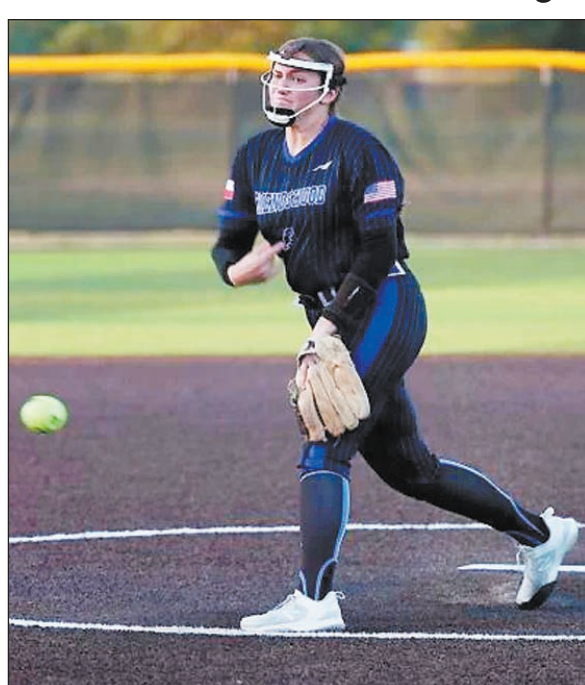

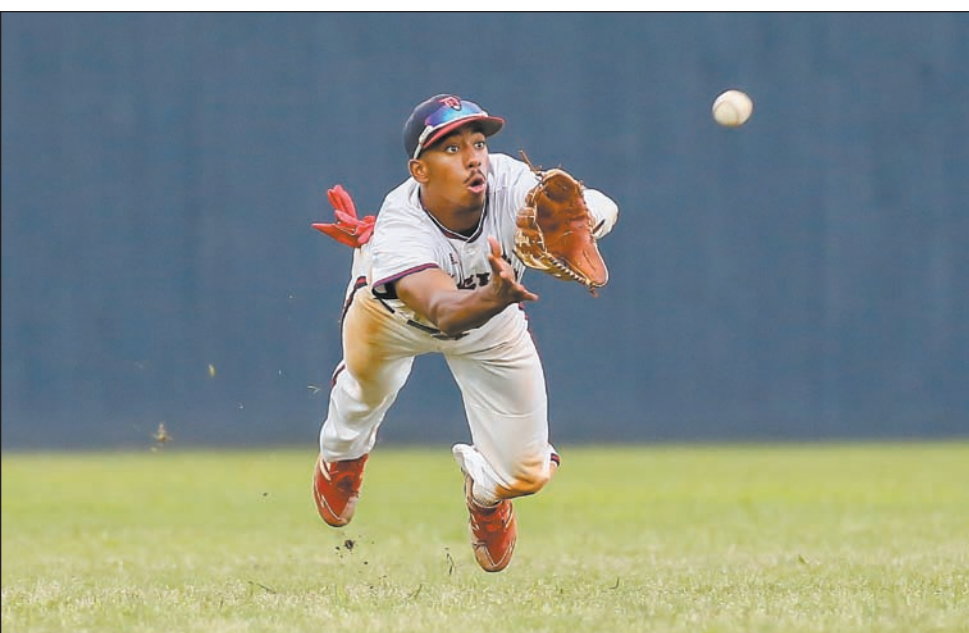

Sales tax holiday for emergency supplies April 22-24

With the severe weather season upon us, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds Texans they can purchase certain items tax-free during the state's sales tax holiday for emergency preparation supplies, which begins at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, April 22, and ends at midnight on Monday, April 24.

"While we can't know in advance when the next flood, tornado or hurricane may strike, we can make sure our families, homes and businesses have the supplies they need to face these and other emergencies," Hegar said. "This tax holiday can help Texans save money while stocking up for emergency situations. Don't wait for disaster to strike. Take the time now to get prepared."

The Comptroller's office estimates shoppers will save nearly \$2 million in state and local sales taxes during the tax holiday, which was approved by the Texas Legislature in 2015.

There's no limit on the number of qualifying items you can purchase. These include:

- household batteries, fuel containers and flashlights priced less than \$75;
- hurricane shutters and emergency lad-

ders priced less than \$300; and

- portable generators priced less than \$3,000.

For purchases made online, note that delivery, shipping, handling and transportation charges are part of the sales price. Consider these charges when determining whether an emergency preparation supply can be purchased tax-free during the holiday.

For example, if you purchase a rescue ladder online for \$299 with a \$10 delivery charge, the total sales price is \$309. Because the total sales price of the ladder is more than \$300, tax is due on the \$309 sales price.

- Purchases that do *not* qualify include:
- batteries for automobiles, boats and other motorized vehicles;
 - camping stoves and camping supplies;
 - chainsaws;
 - plywood;
 - extension ladders and stepladders; and tents.

A list of emergency preparation supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the Comptroller's website at comptroller.texas.gov.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in the CITY OF PEARLAND, TEXAS, on May 6, 2023, in accordance with the following resolution:

RESOLUTION NO. R2023-42

A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Pearland, Texas, ordering a Bond Election to be held within the City of Pearland, Texas; making provisions for the conduct and the giving of notice of the Bond Election; and containing other provisions related thereto

WHEREAS, the City Council (the "City Council") of the City of Pearland, Texas (the "City") finds and determines that an election should be held to determine whether the City Council shall be authorized to issue bonds of the City in the amounts and for the purposes hereinafter set forth; and

WHEREAS, the City will enter into one or more Election Agreements (collectively, the "Election Agreement") with Brazoria County, Texas (the "County"), by and through the County Clerk of the County (the "Administrator"), and possibly other political subdivisions, in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas (the "State") and applicable federal law; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and declares that the meeting at which this Resolution is considered is open to the public, and that the public notice of the time, place and purpose of the meeting was given, as required by Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PEARLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1. Findings. The statements contained in the preamble of this Resolution are true and correct and are hereby adopted as findings of fact and as part of the operative provisions hereof

Section 2. Call of Election; Date; Eligible Electors; and Hours. An election (the "Election") shall be held on May 6, 2023 ("Election Day"), which is seventy-eight (78) or more days from the date of the adoption of this resolution (the "Election Resolution"), within and throughout the territory of the City at which all resident, qualified electors of the City shall be entitled to vote.

Section 3. Polling Places; Election Officers. Except as otherwise provided herein, the boundaries and territories of the County election precincts that are wholly or partially within the territorial boundaries of the City are hereby designated as the voting precincts of the City for the Election and the precinct numbers for the City's election precincts shall be the corresponding County precinct number of each precinct.

In the event that the Administrator shall determine from time to time that (a) a polling place hereafter designated shall become unavailable or unsuitable for such use, or it would be in the City's best interests to relocate such polling place, or (b) a presiding judge or alternate presiding judge hereafter designated shall become unqualified or unavailable, the Administrator, or his designee, is hereby authorized to designate and appoint in writing a substitute polling place, presiding judge or alternate presiding judge, and correct or modify the exhibits to this Election Resolution, giving such notice as is required by the Election Code and as deemed sufficient.

Section 4. Propositions. At the Election there shall be submitted to the resident, qualified electors of the City the following propositions (each, a "Proposition" and collectively, the "Propositions"):

CITY OF PEARLAND, TEXAS - PROPOSITION "A"

Shall the City Council of the City of Pearland, Texas be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the City in the principal amount of \$105,500,000 for permanent public improvements and public purposes, to wit: 1) purchasing, acquiring, enlarging, extending, equipping and constructing drainage improvements and facilities at various locations within the City, including acquiring lands and rights-of-way for any such purposes, 2) purchase of equipment and support facilities in connection with drainage improvements and facilities, 3) engineering and related studies in connection with drainage problems in the City and 4) all matters necessary or incident related thereto; such bonds to mature serially or otherwise over a period not to exceed forty (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold in one or more series at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council at the time of issuance or sale of the bonds; and whether ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in the City sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?

CITY OF PEARLAND, TEXAS - PROPOSITION "B"

Shall the City Council of the City of Pearland, Texas be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the City in the principal amount of \$26,146,000 for permanent public improvements and public purposes, to wit: 1) purchasing and otherwise acquiring land for and constructing, repairing and improving streets, bridges and sidewalks of the City, 2) purchase of equipment and support facilities in connection with street, bridge and sidewalk improvements, 3) engineering and related studies in connection with street, bridge and sidewalk improvements in the City and 4) all matters necessary or incident related thereto; such bonds to mature serially or otherwise over a period not to exceed forty (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold in one or more series at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council at the time of issuance or sale of the bonds; and whether ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in the City sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?

CITY OF PEARLAND, TEXAS - PROPOSITION "C"

Shall the City Council of the City of Pearland, Texas be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the City in the principal amount of \$3,705,000 for permanent public improvements and public purposes, to wit: 1) constructing, repairing, constructing, repairing, improving facilities and equipment for park and recreation purposes and 2) all matters necessary or incident related thereto; such bonds to mature serially or otherwise over a period not to exceed forty (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold in one or more series at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council at the time of issuance or sale of the bonds; and whether ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in the City sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?

Shall the City Council of the City of Pearland, Texas be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the City in the principal amount of \$15,959,000 for permanent public improvements and public purposes, to wit: 1) constructing, repairing, and improving Fire Station No. 7, 2) engineering and related studies in connection with fire facilities and improvements and 3) all matters necessary or incident related thereto; such bonds to mature serially or otherwise over a period not to exceed forty (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold in one or more series at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council at the time of issuance or sale of the bonds; and whether ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in the City sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?

Section 5. Ballots. The ballots shall conform to the requirements of the Election Code and shall have written or printed thereon the following:

The Administrator is hereby authorized and directed to designate the early voting ballot board and other officers required to conduct early voting for the Election.

Section 7. Conduct of Election. The Election shall be conducted by election officers, including the judges and alternate judges or clerks appointed by the City or the Administrator, in accordance with the Election Agreements, the Election Code and the Constitution and laws of the State and the United States of America. The Mayor, the City Secretary and their designee(s) are each authorized to enter into, execute and deliver one or more Election Agreements in accordance with applicable provisions of the Election Code. The terms and provisions of each Election Agreement are hereby incorporated into this Election Resolution. To the extent of any conflict between this Election Resolution and an Election Agreement, the terms and provisions of the Election Agreement shall prevail, and the Mayor, the City Secretary and their designee(s) are each authorized to make such corrections, changes, revisions and modifications to this Election Resolution, including the exhibits hereto, as are deemed necessary or appropriate to conform to the Election Agreement, to comply with applicable state and federal law and to carry out the intent of the City, as evidenced by this Election Resolution. The Administrator shall be responsible for establishing the central counting station for the ballots cast in the Election and appointing the personnel necessary for such station.

Section 8. Bilingual Election Materials. All notices, instructions, and ballots pertaining to the Election shall be furnished to voters in both English and Spanish and persons capable of acting as translators in both English and Spanish shall be made available to assist Spanish language speaking voters in understanding and participating in the election process.

Section 9. Delivery of Voted Ballots; Counting; Tabulation; Canvassing of Returns; Declaring Results. The ballots shall be counted by one or more teams of election officers assigned by the presiding judges, each team to consist of two or more election officers. After completion of his responsibilities under the Election Code, including the counting of the voted ballots and the tabulation of the results, the presiding judge shall make a written return of the Election results to the City in accordance with the Election Code. The City Council shall canvass the returns and declare the results of the Election.

If a majority of the resident, qualified electors of the City voting at the Election, including those voting early, shall vote in favor of a Proposition, then the issuance and sale of the bonds described in the Proposition shall be authorized in the maximum amount contained therein, and the bonds shall be issued and sold at the price or prices and in such denominations determined by the City Council to be in the City's best interest.

Section 10. Training of Election Officials. Pursuant to the Election Code, a public school of instruction for all election officers and clerks may be held as arranged or contracted by the Administrator.

Section 11. Notice of Election; Voter Information Document. Notice of the Election shall be given in the manner required by the Election Code and other applicable law. A voter information document for each Proposition in the form attached hereto as Exhibit C is hereby approved, together with such revisions as may be approved by the Mayor, the City Secretary or their designee(s) and shall be posted and provided in accordance with law.

Section 12. Notice of Meeting. The City Council officially finds, determines, recites and declares that written notice of the date, hour, place and subject of the meeting at which this Election Resolution is adopted was posted on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public at City Hall for a least seventy-two (72) hours preceding the scheduled time of the meeting; that a telephonic or telegraphic notice of such meeting was given to all news media who have consented to pay any and all expenses incurred by the City in connection with providing such notice, both as required by the Texas Open Meetings Act, Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended; and that such meeting was open to the public as required by law at all times during which this Election Resolution and the subject matter thereof was discussed, considered and formally acted upon.

Section 13. Mandatory Statement of Information.

Without limiting the generality

of the immediately preceding sentence, the Mayor, the City Secretary and their designee(s) are each hereby authorized to complete and update, as necessary, the exhibits hereto with the necessary information as same is made available to the City.

Section 15. Authorization to Execute the Election Resolution. The Mayor is authorized to execute and the City Secretary is authorized to attest to this Election Resolution on behalf of the City Council; and the Mayor, the City Secretary and their designee(s) are each authorized to do all other things legal and necessary in connection with the holding and consummation of the Election.

Section 16. Effective Date. This Election Resolution is effective immediately upon its passage and approval.
