Friendswood swimmers collected several medals including gold at the 2023 Class 5A State Swim Meet at the Lee and Joe Jamail Swim Center at the University of Texas in Austin. Junior Tony Laurito set a new Class 5A record in the 200-yard Individual Medley (1:47.34) for one gold medal and he also won the 100-yard backstroke (48.98) while also swimming a leg on the 200-yard Medley Relay team that placed third for a bronze medal (1.34.61). Junior Marshall Odom won a gold medal for a first-place finish in the 100-yard butterfly (49.05), a silver medal for a second-place finish in 50-yard freestyle (20.60), and a bronze medal with a leg on the third-place 200-yard Medley Relay. Sophomore KK LeBlanc captured the gold medal in the girls 100-yard freestyle (49.86) and the silver medal for a second-place finish in the 50-yard freestyle (23.09). The Friendswood boys finished third in the state with 159 points and the Friendswood girls finished in ninth place with 86 points. # Council gets improvement updates

Fire Station #2 reconstruction is underway and 68 percent complete. Target date is May

The Public Safety Building expansion at 1600 Whitaker Drive is 94 percent complete with interior work ongoing. Target date is

Blackhawk Facility Renovation at 15355 Blackhawk Boulevard began on Jan. 17,

third of the building to make it still operational. Shelter renovation component will commence after substantial completion of new offices.

In Harris County Precinct 2 the Blackhawk Blvd. Phase II-B project from Geneva Dr to Pennystone Way off the boulevard will start at the current northern terminus of rebuild street and will extend approximately 1115 feet (.85 lane miles). At the time of the Council meeting, 90 percent of the plans had been delivered to the city and bids are planned to be out soon.

In the Phase II-C project, Blackhawk Blvd. from Pennnystone Way to FM 2351;; Thursa Lane to FM 528) Precinct 2 has opened up application period for its 2023 Partnership Program.

The 24 inch Clear Creek Water Line Crossing Project will run generally parallel to FM 2351 from Surface Station 2 to FM 518. The engineering contract was awarded January 2023.

Surface Water Plant #1 Tank Replacement has its engineering contract awarded January 2023. The plant is at Blackhawk Boulevard

behind Calvary Church. Ground Storage Tank at Ground Water Plant #4 is at 500 W. Castle Harbour. The application has been submitted to the Texas

General Land Office to fund the project. Subdivision Annalea Infrastructure Upgrades on Virginia Lane and Ella Court has also had its application submitted to the Texas General Land Office to fund the project. The project replaces undersized aging waterlines

and reconstructs concrete streets. The Bay Area Boulevard Update is south of FM 528 on Bay Area Blvd. The contractor has been delayed due to wet weather. The lime for soil stabilization has been difficult to obtain due to a large order across the region.

TxDOT projects include FM 518 Curb and Ramp Project and FM 518/FM 528 Intersection improvements.

# HOAs, businesses invited to apply for KFB beautification grant

All businesses and Home Owner Associations (HOAs) located within the city limits of Friendswood are eligible to apply for KFB Grant Incentive Program.

The Keep Friendswood Beautiful Grant Incentive Program is a partnership between the Keep Friendswood Beautiful Board and Friendswood businesses/HOA's, to initiate landscape improvement projects within the city for overall quality of life and beautification of the city. KFB supplies cash reimbursement for a landscape improvement project (not to exceed \$2,000) and the business matches the contribution with cash or in-kind donations, such as local resources of volunteer labor, donated materials, professional services, etc.

Any project approved by KFB and mutually agreed upon that would improve the appearance of the city and the business. The project must meet and comply with City codes and laws. All projects shall be completed within six months of application approval. A variance due to appropriate seasons for certain projects will be considered with permission of KFB. Any increased project cost over the original

grant approved will be borne solely by the applicant and will not be funded by KFB Grant.

Project ideas include, but are not limited to landscaping with trees, bushes, grass, sprinklers, benches, mulch, wood, or stone perimeters, fountains, walkways and especially mature tree preservation; the services of an Urban Forester or a certified arborist to draw up landscaping plans, make suggestions for site plans or trimming and pruning of trees and shrubs; the design package or project must also include a site plan and drawing all improvements with notes defining materials, finishes, and colors. Color samples should also be submitted with the proposal.

Before work begins on any project approved for a grant, the applicants will sign an agreement with Keep Friendswood Beautiful and the City of Friendswood to abide by his or her proposal as approved and to operate under the required guidelines. No grant funds will be paid out on a project unless it is recommended for approval for funding by Keep Friendswood Beautiful and authorized by the City Manager and/or his/her designee.

Upon completion of the project and review by the City, the City will make payment directly to the grantee based on the invoices related to the project and the agreement made with Keep Friendswood Beautiful Grant Fund. They must supply Keep Friendswood Beautiful with all records and comply with all requirements of the City.

Deadline for submission is March 15.


#### THE MOUNTAIN JESUS WENT



# Friendswood swimmers shine at state swim meet

The Friendswood boys and girls had a strong showing at the Class 5A state swim meet at the Lee & Joe Jamail Swim Center on the University of Texas campus in Austin.

Georgetown won the 5A boys state championship with 200 points while Frisco Wakeland finished in second place with 186 points and the Friendswood boys finished in third place with 159 points.

Cedar Park won the 5A girls state title with 194 points while the Friendswood girls finished in ninth place with 86 points.

Friendswood had 14 swimmers and one diver who competed in the state swim meet.

They were: Peyton Becker, Olivia Esbeck, Nick Hardt, Edi Jakob, Andi Jeanes, Tony Laurito, Alex Linden, KK LeBlanc, Paige McCray, Marshall Odom, Paul Podrebarac, Lauren Tillman, Erin Voelker, Talon Welch and Grayson Wells for Diving.

The Mustangs also had some record-setting events at the state meet that resulted in multiple swimmers earning medals.

Tony Laurito had a gold medal performance in the 200-yard Individual medley that included a new Class 5A state record 1:47.34. Laurito also won the 100-yard backstroke in 48.98 and he also swam a leg on the third place 200-yard medley relay team with Nick Hardt, Talon Welch, and Marshall Odom with a time of 1:34.45 for the bronze medal.

Marshall Odom won a gold medal in the 100-yard butterfly with a time of 49.05 while winning a silver medal in the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 20.60. Odom was also on the 200-yard medley relay team that finished in third place.

KK LeBlanc also won two medals for the girls team as she captured a gold medal in the 100-yard freestyle with a time of 49.86 and a silver medal for her second-place finish in the 50-yard freestyle in 23.09.

While Laurito set a new 5A state record in the 200-yard IM, five more FHS records were broken thanks to the efforts of LeBlanc (50yard free; 100-yard free), Laurito (200-yard IM), Odom (100-yard free), and the boys 400yard free relay team.






