

No. 4 state-ranked Pearland was challenged by a talented Kingwood softball squad that forced the Lady O's to play their best to win the best-of-three series in the Class 6A Region III quarterfinals 9-6 and 1-0 at La Porte High School.

In the first game, Pearland jumped out to a 7-0 lead and appeared to be on their way to an easy first game win but Kingwood (31-8) wasn't going to go down so easy.

Pearland scored three runs in the top of the first inning and added two more in the second for a 5-0 advantage.

The Lady Oilers tacked on two more runs in the fourth to give them the 7-0 bulge but then Kingwood cut the lead to 7-2 with a pair of runs in the fifth and then cut the lead to 7-6 with four more runs in the sixth.

Pearland senior shortstop Kristyn Whitlock, a Sam Houston State signee, crushed a

three-run homer to center field in

the top of the first inning. Leadoff hitter Hailey Golden walked before No. 2 hitter Kaylee Schweitzer reached on an error, allowing Golden to advance to third for the 3-0 lead.

Pearland widened the advantage to 5-0 in the second inning.

Golden's opposite field triple to left scored Darian DeLeon, who led off with a single. Golden, a Texas A&M signee, then came home on a Drafton single to left.

The Lady Oilers made it 7-0 in the fourth on a two-run single from Schweitzer.

Pearland received run-scoring doubles from Whitlock and Lydia Njus in the seventh to pull away to its 15th consecutive win 9-6.

"Seven-run leads are never safe when you're playing teams as good as Kingwood," Pearland head coach Laneigh Clark said.

"It's part of the game. I think the kids came back in the seventh after realizing they had taken off

7. It doesn't bother you to use an airport named Will Rogers after a man who died in a airplane crash.


8. You believe "Little Smokies" should only be served on special occasions.



fidence and began to chant "overrated" to the Friendswood faithful which turned out to be a huge mistake as the Mustangs thrashed Milby the rest of the way.



PISD celebrates Better Hearing, Speech Month

In honor of Better Hearing and Speech Month in May, Pearland Independent School District recognizes its professional speech-language pathologists (SLPs) for supporting the academic success of students with hearing and communication challenges.

Pearland ISD's 21 SLPs help prevent, identify, assess and treat speech and language problems that impact students' achievement. Better Hearing and Speech Month provides an opportunity to raise awareness about communication disorders and the role of the Pearland ISD SLPs in providing life-altering treatment.

"Speech-language pathologists work with people every day in settings that include schools, private practices, health care facilities and even their own homes to improve their client's speech, language, social and cognitive skills," said Pearland ISD lead SLP Mary Kate Puna.

According to many SLPs working with children aged from birth to 5 years old, over the past two years, there has been an increase in referrals for concerns about hearing, speech, and language delays. In addition, SLPs polled by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA), note an increasing number of children with behavioral, social, and language difficulties and with undetected hearing loss. Factors contributing to these increased referrals include limited opportunities for social interaction and play with peers, limited preschool/daycare interaction, and increased use of screentime on tablets and smartphones compared to the pre-pandemic years.

Puna advises that the following simple steps can help to identify the signs of com-

munication disorders and provide early intervention to:

Connect with an early intervention program for birth to 3 years of age. Families don't need a referral from a pediatrician to connect with their early intervention program. Find contacts by state at this link: https://www.cdc.gov/ncbddd/actearly/par ents/states.html

Focus on daily interactions with your child. Talking, singing, playing, and reading books together are simple yet immensely effective ways to boost communication and social skills. These activities actually build a child's brain. Birth to 3 years is a time when the brain is most adaptable, but these activities are crucial beyond that period. Limit recreational screen time when possible.

Plenty of play time. Free play develops creativity and teaches kids to entertain themselves. No need for screens to keep them busy! Children learn not only by sight and sound but by touch, taste, and smell—senses that screens can't activate.

How Much Screen Time?

The American Academy of Pediatrics makes the following screen time recommendations for toddlers:

Under 18 months: No screen time except for video chatting with loved ones.

18–24 months: A small amount, at most, of high-quality programming, if you choose.

2–5 years: A maximum of 1 hour per day. "Co-view" (watch together) rather than have young children (of any age) use screens while alone.
