Thursday is deadline for casting ballot

This Thursday, April 6, is the last day to register to vote in the May 6 election, which in Pearland will include four bond propositions totaling approximately \$181.3 million as well as three city council seats.

Early voting will begin April 24 at 8 a.m. at 11 county-wide locations include the Tom Reid Library, West Pearland Community Center and West Pearland Library.

Four bond proposals in the City of Pearland will be decided separately, meaning each city resident can vote for none, one, several or all of the propositions:

Proposition A: \$105.5 million for drainage projects throughout the city including Veterans Road, southwest quadrant of Old Town, Shady Crest and Creek View, Longwood Park and Harkey Road.

Proposition B: \$26.14 million for city streets, bridges and sidewalks, including the city's sidewalk gap program.

Proposition C: \$33.7 million for parks and recreation, including expansions to sports



facilities such as Hickory Slough Sportsplex Phase II.

Proposition D: \$15.96 million for construction and repair Fire Station No. 7.

If all four propositions pass, the total \$181.3 million would have an annual tax impact of \$24.38 on a home valued at \$250,000 with a homestead exemption, \$34.13 on a \$350,000 home and \$39 on a \$400,000 property, according to city staff.

The last day to apply for a mail ballot for those who qualify is April 25. Voters can check their status, register to vote and apply for a mail ballot online at votetexas.gov.

Pearland could host 2024 veterans parade

The Brazoria County's Veterans Day Parade will likely be held in the City of Pearland in 2024.

It would be the first time the parade is held in the county's most populated city.

John Jasso, chairman of the Brazoria County Veterans Association and founder of the parade, approached Pearland City Council last week regarding the 26th annual parade scheduled in 2024.

The upcoming Veteran's Day Parade will be

held in Angleton on Nov. 11. "Everybody in Brazoria County has hosted the Veterans Day Parade but Pearland," Jasso said, "and I've been asked by a lot of the veterans in Pearland to bring it to Pearland."

The county veterans association represents 17 different posts throughout the county.

"All we're trying to do is get the guys out of the shadows and into the limelight so people here can see who your veterans are," said Jasso, himself a veteran who served in Vietnam. "All we need is a mile and two-tenths for the parade route. We would be

bringing all the other veterans from Brazoria County to Pearland that day, so you're going to have a lot of people up here to celebrate."

Mayor Kevin Cole on Monday directed the city's Parks and Recreation Department to visit with the association to possibly begin the planning process.

"Thank you for your service not only to your country, but to this event," he said.

Jasso also invited Pearland residents to attend this year's Veteran's Day parade in Angleton. Last year's parade was held in Sweeny.

Inclusive play park set to open

The grand opening of an inclusive playground at Pearland's Shadow Creek sports complex has been slated for April 22.

Originally expected to open in 2022, the long-awaited Ed Thompson Inclusive Park is the result of fundraising, grants and corporate support.

The grand opening is 9 a.m. at the park, 13050 Shadow Creek Parkway, with walking tours to begin at 10:15 a.m. along with children's activities, a community resource fair, story time sessions and food trucks.

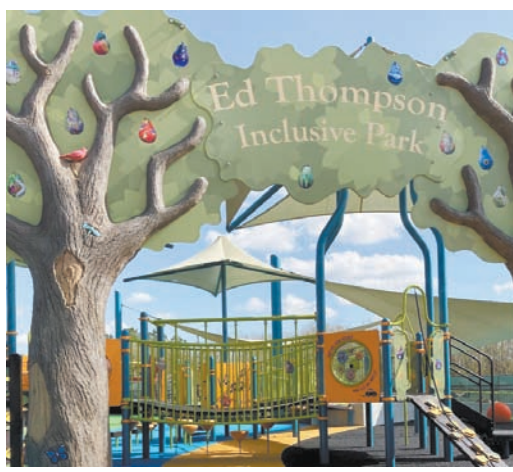
Officials expected to attend include the playground's namesake, State Rep. Ed Thompson, who helped secure a \$750,000

from Texas Parks and Wildlife for the facility. The 9,200-square-foot playground is designed to allow interaction among all ages and abilities through accessible slides, swings, beams and sensory play surrounded by seating for gatherings.

Pearland Convention and Visitors Bureau collaborated to provide a Pear-Scape Seek and Find theme and the production of a new pear installation at the park.

The play scape is a collaboration among Inclusion Matters by Shane's Inspiration, the City of Pearland and the nonprofit Forever Parks Foundation of Pearland, which began raising money for an inclusive playground in 2020.

The playground includes a monument recognizing those who contributed.



Deadline nears for mobility plan input

The last round of public input for the 20-year regional mobility plan for the Houston-Galveston area ends on April 17.

Updated every four years, the long-term plan guides transportation funding through the year 2045.

"This plan describes the region's vision, goals and implementation strategies," HGAC Regional Planning Manager Anita Hollmann Matijcio said during a March 21 virtual meeting.

One topic of concern is the rising number of accidents involving pedestrians. Feedback thus far has also showed residents outside Beltway 8 want shorter commutes and better public transportation.

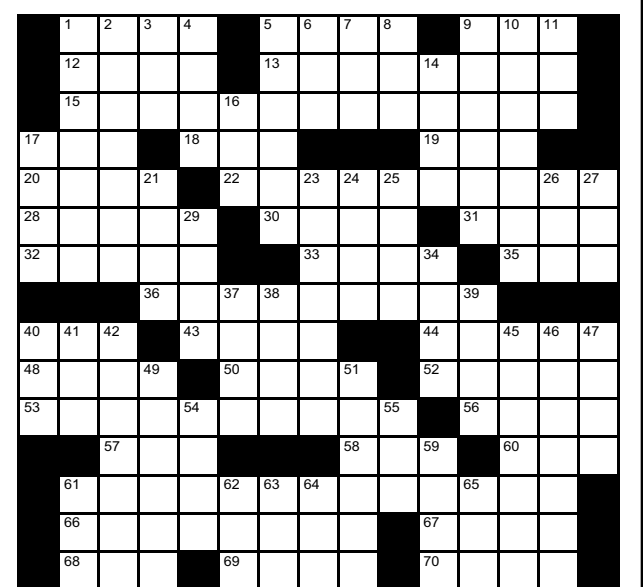

IT ALL HANGS ON EASTER

“Now, let me ask you something profound yet troubling. If you became believers because you trusted the proclamation that Christ is alive, risen from the dead, how can you let people say that there is no such thing as a resurrection? If there’s no resurrection, there’s no living Christ. And face it—if there’s no resurrection for Christ, everything we’ve told you is smoke and mirrors, and everything you’ve staked your life on is smoke and mirrors. Not only that, but we would be guilty of telling a string of barefaced lies about God...”
- 1 Corinthians 15:12-14

They hung Jesus up on a cross on a Friday. By Sunday morning everything was different! Everything... as in how we mark time then and now in A.D. 2023 along with the whole liturgical church year! It all hangs on Easter. Let me explain. This is a good teaching moment.

Easter is the most important day in the Christian story. It is God’s prophecy and promise come full circle! Sin is vanquished! Eternal life is promised and the power of the evil one is thwarted. Forever! Some have a different view. Some say Good Friday is the most important day as this is the day we remember Jesus died on the cross for the sins of the world... a “once and for all thing.” St. Paul pointed out. Others think Christmas is the key... for if Jesus as God-in-the-flesh had not come to live among us there would be no Good Friday and therefore no Easter. But, if you are like me then you’ll agree that Easter is the day for when the women and the disciples came to the tomb, they had no choice but to proclaim... “God is on the loose!” Jesus is risen from the grave and a new lease on life is granted to all... and then this is what happens that the rest of the church year hangs in the balance over...

NOTE: Other than “saints days” and some “festival days” there are few ‘fixed’ days on the liturgical church calendar. Easter is not one of them. Christmas is (12/25). Epiphany is (1/6). All Saints Day is (11/1).

Thus... Ash Wednesday and Easter flex in the Springtime

based on being the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox (March 21)... and always connected to the Jewish Passover! And that’s why Easter comes early some years and later on other years. But... no earlier than March 23 (if the full moon was on March 22 and that was a Saturday. And the latest it can be is April 25) and now you see why the weeks of Epiphany shift from 4 weeks to 8 weeks between the Day of Epiphany (January 6) and Ash Wednesday... again determined by counting back the 40 days of Lent based on what? Easter! Then this all gets drawn out over the Summer and Fall. The Easter season lasts 50 days and leads to Pente(50)cost! And if Easter is early... then the weeks of the time of Pentecost will last longer pushing to Thanksgiving time... and if Easter is late... then the weeks of Pentecost will still roll to Thanksgiving time but not with as many Sundays... THEN there is Advent... with Advent 1 Sunday being the closest to St. Andrew’s Day (NOV 30)...

And, Pastor, why is this all so important? For all the same reasons we keep track of when we were born and when we had our first kiss and when we got married and when we bought our first car... and so many other days we recall throughout our lives. We mark them because they are important and yet... they are just days on a timeline that lasts only so far... the cultural calendar we point to... but when it comes to our faith calendar... we see lots of shifting, as in the details of life, but everything matters because of Easter. For, it is in the Easter story that all of life has an eternal newness and true purpose for each and every day... the “resurrected life” ... we say... along with St. Paul... now and forever! Faith matters.

April: A Great Month for Gardening

April welcomes spring weather and gardening becomes a pleasure since temperatures have not reached their summer highs and blooming plants and fresh growth are everywhere.

Beware a trip to a store with a plant area as the ‘March Madness’ feeling is not completely over and going for one plant can fill a car with unexpected purchases. But do enjoy the visits to nurseries as if on a small vacation enjoying the beauty of what is available now for gardens.

Here are the April To Do Tasks for Gardeners:

This is the last month for planting wax and lima beans, pintos, snap bush and pole beans. Plant these herb transplants: basil, lavender, Mexican mint marigold and scented geranium. Plant okra now to mid-May. Okra has a long harvesting season, through to August.

Feed established roses every four to six weeks with formulated rose fertilizer.

Fertilize lawns in the spring after grass puts out new growth. Use a 15-5-10 fertilizer.

Prune azaleas as they finish blooming. Fertilize azaleas for the first time after blooms fall. Use an azalea fertilizer repeat in six weeks. Fertilize the azaleas one more time in June, but no later than this because of disrupting bloom set for the following year in the shrub’s dormant period.

Camellias need to be pruned and fertilized after flowering. Remove interior branches along with dead wood to provide better air circulation. Use a well-balanced fertilizer to promote growth and blooms.

Prune flowering shrubs and trees after they bloom. This includes flowering quince (*Chaenomeles speciosa*) and bridal wreath (*Spiraea* sp.).

Set out vincas after mid-April to help reduce problems with fungal blight.

Plant cleome, four-o’clocks, plumbago, hibiscus and shrimp plant (*Justicia brandegeana*) for summer color. The following plants can be planted in shady areas: impatiens, coleus, begonias and pentas.

Plant the following tuberous plants: gloriosa lily, daylily (*Hemerocallis* sp.), butterfly lily, (*Hedychium coronarium*, fragrant, white-blooming species of ginger), red spider lily (*Lycoris radiata*), rain lilies (*Zephyranthes grandiflora*), yellow spider lily (*Lycoris aurea*), Shell Ginger (*Alpinia* sp.), and tuberose (*Agave amica*). Plant caladium tubers this month; whites and greens do well in the shade, the reds need partial sun.

Add mulch to flowers, shrubs and trees. This will help to discourage weeds and conserve soil moisture during the hot summer months. The mulch should be two to four inches thick. Remember to leave breathing room or free space around the trunks of trees. Piling too much mulch around tree trunks could cause microbial decay of the tree trunk.

Keep aphids, thrips and caterpillars controlled. Check in the morning for insects in the vegetable garden and hand pick the insects if possible. Check roses for black spot fungus. Keep the areas around blooming flowers clear of debris that could harbor insects.

MASTER NATURALISTS HAWK WATCHERS

Local naturalists watch the skies for migrating hawks

Every early spring since 1996, members of the Galveston Bay Area Chapter of Texas Master Naturalists have gathered their binoculars, lawn chairs, data sheets and coffee to watch the skies for migrating hawks heading back into North America from their winter vacation.

When the hawks come upon Galveston Bay, they are hesitant to cross such a large body of water. As a result, in the

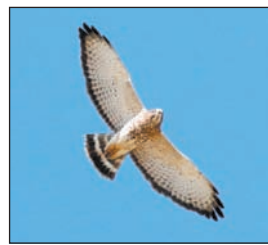
Spring they tend to funnel along the upper bay shoreline looking for a narrow pass. Typical migrants observed are the broad-winged hawks, Mississippi kites, and turkey and black vultures.

From March 1 to April 30, naturalists watch for migrants at Sylvan Beach in LaPorte. Naturalists study size, body and wing shape, color patterns, and even behavior to help identify species. They note which ones are truly migrating north versus our local residents.

Last year 18,485 hawks were observed. Out of the total, 89 percent were seen across just four days which makes a lucky few observers feel like they have won the birding lottery.

The highest count recorded was 60,458 in 2009 but last year’s numbers were average for the 27-year survey history.

All data is shared with the Hawk Migration Association of North America to help monitor population trends and support their continued scientific study.

What are the odds Jesus will come back? That also would be...100 percent.

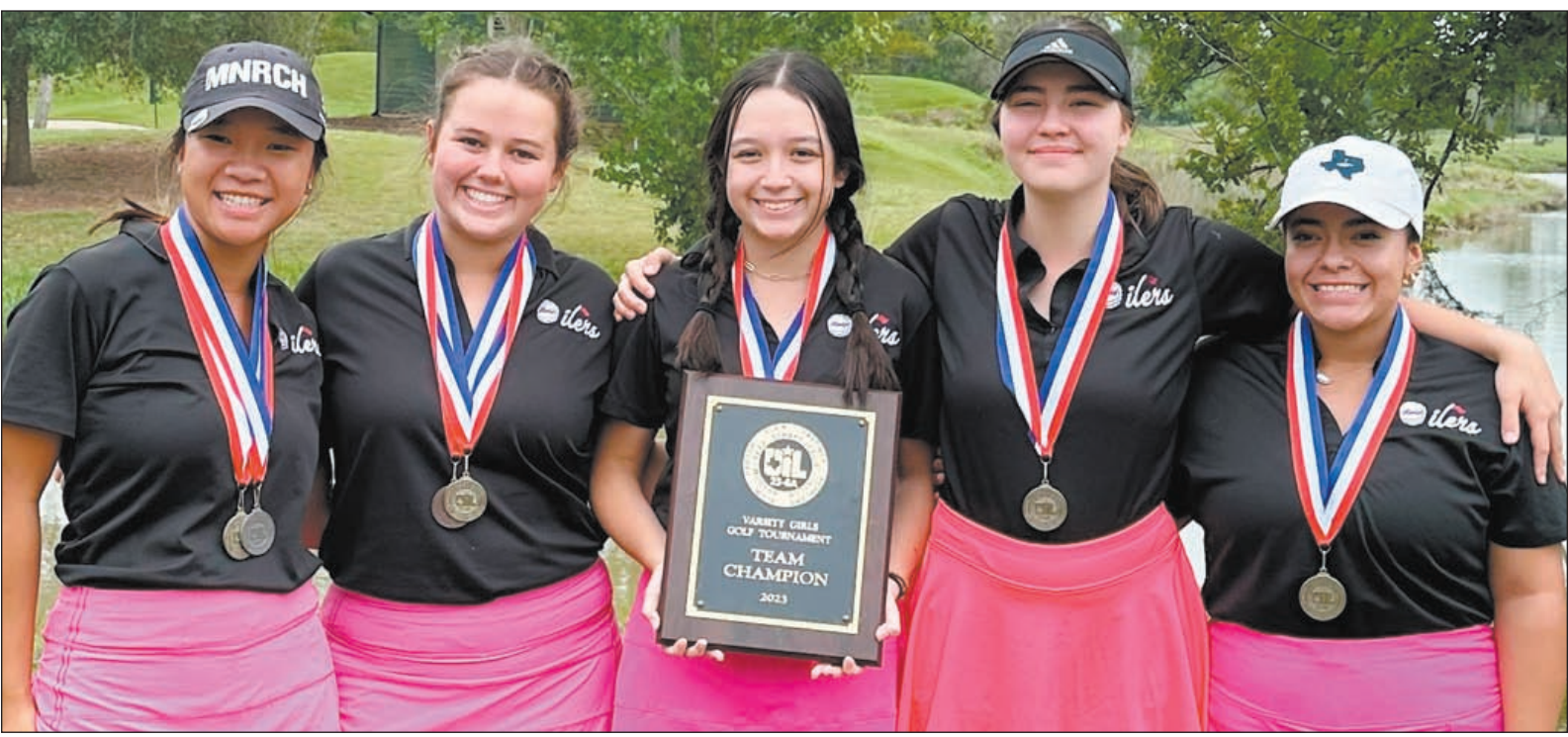
What are the odds God wants you to raise your children in the right way? Again, that is...100 percent.

"We knew we had to account for the speed that they have going forward," Friendswood head girls soccer coach Laura Peter said. "They're very good in the air, and they're very physical. We tried to make sure we were ready in the middle of the field because their midfield was very strong."

After taking the 2-0 lead, the Lady Indians had more shot attempts in the first half, firing off seven more shots — including two on-goal and three others on dangerous free kicks that just missed.

Unfortunately, the Lady Mustangs, which had just three total shots in the first half, two of which were on target, were unable to penetrate the goal leaving the Lady Indians with a 2-0 lead at intermission.

"In the first half, especially, we didn't transition into attack fast enough, but we did a better job in the second half," Peter said.

Friendswood's goals leader, who had to fight through defensive double teams, finally broke through in the 67th minute for a score.

Schmidt managed to weave through a hoard of PN-G defenders for a run to the goal, where she was stopped after getting fouled in the penalty area.

On the ensuing penalty kick, Schmidt eased a ball past the keeper to cut the Lady Mustangs' deficit in half at 2-1.

"Pretty much every team we've played has put two or three people on her, so she expects it," Peter said. "It's nothing new, but it was kind of hard because she was up there by herself a lot."

Friendswood kept fighting till the end. In the 79th minute, RK Rudolph had a brief look at the goal, but a shot skimmed just a bit wide.

Friendswood graduates just three seniors, although all three are key starters: Schmidt, Brooke Spinks and goalkeeper Ellen Fairbanks.

"We're going to miss our seniors a lot," Peter said about the class of 2023, which experienced a run to the state semifinal and two other runs to the regional tournament during their four years.

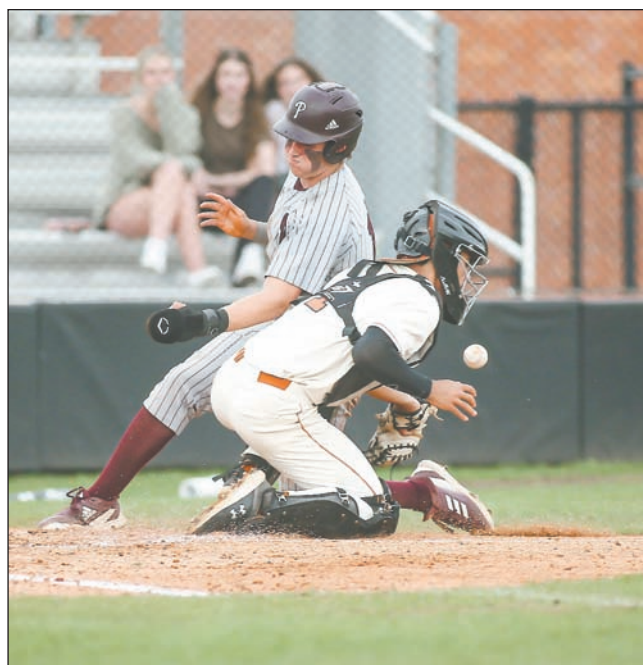
