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Bond packages head to voters

City of Pearland voters will decide May 6 on four bond propositions totaling approximately \$181.3 million.

City Council on Monday voted unanimously to call the May election on four separate bond proposals. City residents will be able to vote for none, one, several or all of the propo-

"If you have a favorite pet project you can break those up and vote for the ones you want," Councilman Jeffrey Barry said.

Proposition A would authorize the issuance of \$105.5 million in general obligation bonds for drainage projects throughout the city. A citizen's drainage bond committee last year

Paul Eskine, Citizen's Drainage Committee

recommended a list of priority drainage projects totaling to be placed on the ballot.

"This bond package includes the entire list from the committee," said Paul Eskine, who served on the committee. "Our city fell behind for many decades on the refurbishing our city's drainage infrastructure. Many of our older subdivisions never had any engineered

Proposition B calls for \$26.14 million for city streets, bridges and sidewalks, including the city's sidewalk gap program.

Proposition C dedicates \$33.7 million for parks and recreation.

Proposition D calls for \$15.96 million for construction and repair Fire Station No. 7.

If all are approved by voters, the total \$181.3 million would have an annual tax impact of \$24.38 on a home valued at \$250,000, \$34.13 on a \$350,000 home and \$39 on a \$400,000 property, according to city staff. Those calculations are for properties with a homestead exemption.

Still, completed projects would also add more operations and maintenance costs to the city's general fund.

ISD Oks new school calendar

Pearland ISD students won't return from next year's holiday break until Jan. 10, based on a 2023-24 academic calendar just approved by the school board.

Trustees adopted the calendar Feb. 7 5-1, with Trustee Kristopher Schoeffler casing the lone vote against, suggesting earlier in the meeting the district take a few weeks to get more community input. Trustee Crystal Carbone noted more parent

feedback on the calendar this year.

"The primary concern was the winter break, and there were some parents interested in having a February break and an October break," she said. "I want to make sure we validate all the concerns that were brought to us."

The return from the holiday break typically fluctuates around Jan. 2 or 3, district staff

"The length of this year's winter break was 13 days and the length of (next year's) winter

break is 13 days," Superintendent Larry Berger said. "I do understand it extends further into January but as far as length it's only

The calendar was developed by the 2023-2024 District Advisory Calendar Committee, which is made up of teachers and parents.

"Clear Creek has a similar calendar, and there are other calendars out there that have a fall and a spring break," Berger said. "They've added two extra vacation weeks in their calendar and that's not something that we're going toward. You have to look at the number of minutes in the school year to make sure you get proper funding. There are many facets of a school calendar in play."

The last day of fall classes is Dec. 20 is set as an early dismissal day, followed by the winter break from Dec. 21 until Jan. 10, the beginning of the second semester. Jan. 8 and 9 are in-service days. The calendar has schools dismissed for the summer before Memorial Day weekend.

Other highlights include:

The first day of school for students will be Tuesday, Aug. 15, 2023.

In-service days for the fall semester are proposed for Sept. 18, Oct. 9, Nov. 10 and Dec.

A full week for Thanksgiving break is Nov.

Spring break is scheduled March 11-15 and

holidays include March 29 and April 1. Additional staff workdays in the second semester are proposed for Feb. 19 and March

The last instructional day for students will be Thursday, May 23, 2024, which would be

State of City:

Mayor tackles tough topics at address

From firing the city manager to an oft criticized traffic circle, no topic was off limits during Mayor Kevin Cole's State of the City Address hosted Thursday by the Pearland Chamber of Commerce.

Among those topics was the recent 13 percent hike in city water rates, which Cole said was caused by factors such as continuing capital needs such as building new capacity and maintaining older plants.

"We are in the midst of a capital improvement program, and that comes with costs," he told the audience. "Capital is a big driver of our rates right now. There's a detailed analysis that goes into (rate increases)."

Water is regulated by the state, which has requirements on capacity.

The city's water and sewer fund are part of an enterprise fund and thus must operate like a business, according to city's chief financial officer Amy Johnson.

"It needs to be self-supporting," she said. "We recently aligned the rate model with the five-year (capital improvements plan)."

City leaders also recently learned about a 40% increase on chemical costs.

"That goes into the rate," Cole said. "That's one component. We still have to treat the water coming in and water leaving."

Ultimately, he said, rates are in the hands of

elected officials, but those officials also have

to balance water rates with the capacity needs.

"There is political pressure each year, 'Don't you dare raise my rate,' when we are also facing capital improvement (needs)," Cole said. "You've seen more and more places across the country having prob-

lems with water and sewer. It is a looming crisis in our country. We've heard about Jackson Miss. and Flint, Michigan. We don't want to be the next Jackson Mississippi. You can't live without water."

'Suicide circle'

Another contentious subject is that of the recently rebuilt and reopened Pearland Parkway traffic circle, described by some as "suicide circle." "The circle has been open six months. Since

then? two accidents. In the six months prior, there was 19," said Cole, who took written questions from audience members during his address. "I would say the improvements to the traffic circle helped. It was a good thing we did it."

'It was a train wreck'

The mayor also didn't shy away from a recently uncovered error that put the City of Pearland in headlines for a \$10 million budget shortfall. He described the day he found out

"I was leaving City Hall when the city manager was receiving the news," Cole said. "I thought he was going to throw up on the scene. It was a raw moment in time."

Estimated values provided in July by Harris County, in which part of Pearland lies, turned out to be erroneous.

"It was a train wreck," Cole said. "Thankfully, we found out one month into the budget and not six months in."

The city is hiring a firm to determine how the error happened, how the city could have

caught it and how to prevent it in the future. Since then, he said, the city has amended its

budget to shore up the shortfall. "We walked council through it. We walked through it with the rest of the staff," he said. "The good news is we have amended our

good year." 'The right thing to do'

The city's subsequent firing of City Manager Clay Pearson was also discussed.

budget and are on the path to having a very

"It's never easy, never fun," Cole said. "There's a human side to all this. But at the end of the day, council felt necessary we needed a change in direction. It just seemed every 180 days it was the next thing that popped

Cole said that ultimately, the situation was handled with respect, "because it's the right thing to do."



City OKs permit for assisted living

facility at 3205 Dixie Farm Road took a step forward Monday night with city council's approval of a special use permit. The council approved the conditional use

permit 5-1, with Councilman Alex Kamkar voting against. The plan has met with concerns by resi-

dential neighbors, including lighting, noise, dumpsters and traffic. "The owner has never reached out to us to

come to some kind of compromise," Pine Hollow resident Angela Ornelas told

The council attached a restriction to the

CUP stating the portion of the property located near neighboring residences, east of a pipeline on the site, remain undeveloped **POSTAL NOTICE**

or as green space. This means an amendment to the conditional use permit would be

needed for development on that portion. In 2020, city council approved a conditional use permit for an assisted living facility at the location, but that permit expired after a year went by without a building permit submitted.

Now the applicant, Friendswood-based G and G Partners Development, is seeking to renew the permit.

The 9.6-acre site was zoned as neighborhood services in 2017.

Plans for the one-story assisted living facility with memory care are the same as those approved in 2020. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended granting the special use permit during its meeting last month.

"Now, fellow Israelites, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did your leaders. But this is how God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, saying that his Messiah would suffer. Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord..." - Acts of the Apostles 3:17-19

Call it... "REFRESH23..." here, there and everywhere... and I can't help myself after all these years and even though I teased about it just a little in last week's post... I can say with confident and humble enthusiasm... the season of Lent is knocking on the door... my favorite time of the year and an opportunity for each one of us to engage in some thoughtful reflection. Are you ready? Faith Matters. It does!

Lent is the oldest of the seasons built into the ancient Christian church year... when it comes to spiritual calisthenics of the heart and mind! Many find these 40 days helpful. Others ignore them completely and even some chuckle within when 'church folks' talk about it as it sure sounds a lot like belly button fuzz... but all of us understand the value of checking up on ourselves... looking within... pondering deeper than navel gazing... taking genuine stock in oneself whether it be an NFL coach or player who just lost the Superbowl or whether a nurse's accreditation is up for renewal or even when a school teacher insists on upping the bar of their classroom abilities... it actually is a good thing... a faith 'check-up' that is... but even so... going beyond oneself and taking time to evaluate how things are between us and God... and as pitchers and catchers show up for Spring training in a few short weeks... A moment when people could have responded at his greatest point of need in life...he experienced rejection. I certainly could relate, though not to the same degree, but none the less, I understood.

In past years I have had the opportunity to meet hundreds of people. I was introduced to many of them through the reading of this column.

This form of communication, for the most part, has been an attempt to convey positive words and support to others. Of course, there are times that one has to take a stand when an unjust accusation has been made toward someone when the accuser(s) haven't taken the time to look deep enough into who they are seeking to criticize.

I remember a girl in Del Rio, Texas who gave me a slip of paper with these words written on it after speaking at her school. She wrote: "A real friend is someone who understands your past...believes in your future...and accepts you today just the way you are."

Not bad from a sophomore in high school. Whether she wrote it herself or read it somewhere and copied it from another source — this young lady had etched in her heart the true meaning of friendship.

I am thankful for real friends and their encouraging words.

Mark Twain once said, "I can live three weeks on a compliment."

People who have friends and easily make friends are usually very happy people. Have you ever noticed that? When they walk in a room — people naturally smile and wave at them glad to see them — delighted they are a part of the festivities. They light up a room.

On the other hand, those who are filled with: "I'm always right" -"You're always wrong" — type attitudes can ruin a happy occasion. They have a lot of baggage that they want others to carry for them that is usually labeled critical, unhappy, and bitter.

I would hope you would take the time today to think about the friends you have in your life. Someone once said that you are a very rich person if you have a trusted friend in your life. Treasure that friendship and in turn also be a friend.

Old friend Robert said, "A real friend is someone who walks into your life when the rest of the world has walked out."

Dawson crowned 23-6A champions with win over Elsik

Winning or sharing a district championship has been the DNA of the Dawson Eagles boys basketball program that is under the leadership of head coach Mark Barre.

The Eagles defeated the Alief Elsik Rams which improved their overall record to 29-5 and 13-1 in district. The 58-46 win gave Dawson the outright District 23-6A crown for the 11th

Dawson has either shared or

won the title outright 11 out of the past 12 years.

Barre has forged an overall record of 395 wins and 180 losses as the only head coach at Dawson since it opened in 2007.

Dawson took control of the game against Alief Elsik early and the outcome was never in doubt.

The Eagles jumped out to a 15-6 first quarter lead with a strong offensive effort while working a suffocating defense.

Dawson extend the lead in the second quarter 20-10 which gave them a 35-16 lead at intermission.

Elsik attempted a comeback in the third quarter with 16 points while Dawson managed nine points to close the gap to 44-32 heading into the final frame.

Both teams scored 14 points in the fourth quarter leaving the Eagles with the 58-46 district win.

Leading Dawson on offense was Jaden Miller (6 assists, 3 steals) and Larry Lyons who both tossed in 16 points while Kendrick Bailey tossed in 10

points while also grabbing five

rebounds and three assists. The Eagles hit 18-of-27 free throws.

Strake Jesuit survives against Pearland 72-57

The game between Pearland and Strake Jesuit was a bitter-sweet contest as this would be the final home game for the Oilers this season and also it would be the last game that Pearland head coach Steve Buckelew would be coaching in the "Pressure Pit" as he has made the decision to retire after 28 years at

Buckelew took an anemic Pearland basketball program in 1995 and turned it into a recognized Houston area power that was known for a pressing, suffocating defense with a deliberate offense.

With one game remaining when Pearland travels to face the Alief Hastings Bears (late

Tuesday), Buckelew should finish with 830 wins and 322 losses over a 38-year span. The veteran coach is the winningest coach

in Pearland HS basketball history with 598

wins and 235 losses.

Over the 28 years Buckelew has been at the helm, the Oilers have made 22 UIL playoff appearances, 24 seasons of 20-plus wins, 4 seasons of 30 wins or more and one trip to the Texas Final Four state basketball tournament (1997-1998).

This year's team has been one of the youngest that Buckelew has ever coached and while the Oilers won't be advancing to the post-season, the team still showed a lot of hustle and effort in every game.

Such was the case against the playoffbound Strake Jesuit Crusaders who entered the game tied for the No. 2 seed in District 23-6A.

Despite the scoring effort of Pearland junior Julian Valentine who fired in 24 points including four treys, Strake countered with Jace Posey who scored 27 points with a pair

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

Request for Qualifications and Scope of Work

The City of Pearland is requesting Statements of Qualifications (SOQ) from firms that can adequately demonstrate they have the resources, experience, and qualifications to fulfill the role of Engineering Design Consultant for the Melvin Knapp Activity Center (KAC) Outdoor Expansion project. The facility is located at 2424 Park Avenue, Pearland TX 77581. The respondent should select a team of professionals capable of providing the required services in an efficient manner in the best interest of the City of Pearland and that will provide successful, on-time, and on-budget project delivery. Information on all proposed sub-consultants should be included in the response.

The city is seeking a firm that meets the requirements of the RFQ. The firm is to provide architectural design and any applicable surveying and/or engineering professional services necessary for the enclosure of the current 1,500 -2,000 square foot open-air patio area, located in the west-southwest portion of the existing facility. The intent of the expansion is to extend the available program space at the Center, allowing additional square footage for exercise and fitness activities, dancing, holiday gatherings, and other structured enjoyment and entertainment activities. The successful Offeror will present the necessary qualifications, experience, capacity, and expertise for providing the architectural design elements to be used in the construction of the patio enclosure.

The Intent of this Request for Qualifications

From this RFQ, the city will select a Primary Design Firm for the project. The project is envisioned to have a Primary Design Firm under the direction and management of the City's Engineering and Public Works Department - Capital Projects Division. The Primary Design Firm will be responsible for the successful management, design, and construction administration of the overall project. In addition, the successful Offeror will be responsible for managing, directing, and coordinating any and all teams of engineering firms and/or other sub-consultants it assembles to complete the required work.

Federal Funding

The City of Pearland was awarded federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) in 2020 (B-20-MC-48-0400), a portion of which has been allocated for facility improvements at the KAC. Some of the allocation will be used for the non-construction related costs of the project, which is comprised of the architectural design of the improvements described herein.

Both non-construction and construction costs of this project are funded by HUD, and applicable regulations may include certain federal Uniform Administrative Requirements (2 CFR 200), including but not limited to: Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Non-discrimination) and Section 3 of the HUD Act (24 CFR Part 135). Davis-Bacon Act labor provisions are NOT applicable to this phase of the project, as no construction activities are being solicited at
