

Capital needs concern PISD leaders

The 88th state legislature is well under way and local school districts are among those hoping for solutions for public education.

A 2019 overhaul of the state's education funding system raised public education spending, but ballooning inflation and the pandemic's effects on inflation, enrollment and have left their mark on Texas public schools.

Pearland ISD has listed approximately \$5.7 million in priority projects on its capital renewal plan. Without receiving sufficient state funding, Superintendent Larry Berger told the Board of Trustees during a Feb. 7 discussion, the district is looking at a voter-approved bond to finance its most pressing needs.

"We just had a tax ratification election and I

islative session, that's going to be the only way we can keep the school district functioning."

Reading through the district's capital report was a frightening process, Schoeffler told fellow board members on Feb. 7.

"I feel like it's just a massive game of kick the can," he said. "We keep postponing things when we don't have the money to do them."

Of the district's 207 buses, 123 are beyond their 15-year service life, he pointed out.

"We're not able to space things out," he said. "I would never in my home or in my business want to take on replacing a roof, replacing all my air conditioners, fixing my driveway and levelling my foundation all in one year. But it seems like that's kind of what we're going to be faced with."

Outside firm hired to look at **budget error**

An independent firm has been hired to look into the City of Pearland's budgeting process, particularly into the causes of a \$10 million budget shortfall uncovered in November.

"We wanted to get this done sooner," Mayor Kevin Cole said shortly before the council approved the contract Feb. 13. "The hard part was finding independents, finding a group that hadn't worked



for the city, hadn't worked for Harris County, hadn't worked for Brazoria County or any of the other entities (involved."

The error overstating property values within the city has been attributed to incorrect tax calculations included in a Harris County Appraisal District worksheet that was sent to Brazoria County. Pearland city staff used that worksheet to create the city's budget and tax rate, creating a revenue shortfall.

The city's already-adopted general fund was overbudget by \$4.7 million and debt service fund by \$5.6 million. City council and staff have since adopted budget amendments to help shore up the differences that include dipping into reserves, reallocating federal funds and reducing payments into its vehicle fleet fund.

"We know what happened; we need somebody independent to verify that," Cole said. "Not just us saying it. More importantly after that is getting fresh eyes to say how we make sure this doesn't happen again."

Council voted unanimously Feb. 13 to award the \$36,750 contract to Keller, Texas-based Strategic Government Resources, a company that specializes in management, training and recruitment for government entities. The firm will auditor the city's overall tax calculation process and make best practice recommendations. "I'm happy to finally get this project moving," Councilman Tony Carbone said. "It's a good team with relevant experience." The contract is below \$50,000, meaning city policy did not require it to be an agenda item approved by council. "We wanted to make sure we're keeping with transparency with this from the moment we found it out," Cole said.

All businesses and Home Owner Associations (HOAs) located within the city limits of Friendswood are eligible to apply for KFB Grant Incentive Program.

The Keep Friendswood Beautiful Grant Incentive Program is a partnership between the Keep Friendswood Beautiful Board and Friendswood businesses/HOA's, to initiate landscape improvement projects within the city for overall quality of life and beautification of the city. KFB supplies cash reimbursement for a landscape improvement project (not to exceed \$2,000) and the business matches the contribution with cash or in-kind donations, such as local resources of volunteer labor, donated materials, professional services, etc.

Any project approved by KFB and mutually agreed upon that would improve the appearance of the city and the business. The project must meet and comply with City codes and laws. All projects shall be completed within six months of application approval. A variance due to appropriate seasons for certain projects will be considered with permission of KFB. Any increased project cost over the original

grant approved will be borne solely by the applicant and will not be funded by KFB Grant.

Project ideas include, but are not limited to landscaping with trees, bushes, grass, sprinklers, benches, mulch, wood, or stone perimeters, fountains, walkways and especially mature tree preservation; the services of an Urban Forester or a certified arborist to draw up landscaping plans, make suggestions for site plans or trimming and pruning of trees and shrubs; the design package or project must also include a site plan and drawing all improvements with notes defining materials, finishes, and colors. Color samples should also be submitted with the proposal.

Before work begins on any project approved for a grant, the applicants will sign an agreement with Keep Friendswood Beautiful and the City of Friendswood to abide by his or her proposal as approved and to operate under the required guidelines. No grant funds will be paid out on a project unless it is recommended for approval for funding by Keep Friendswood Beautiful and authorized by the City Manager and/or his/her designee.

Upon completion of the project and review by the City, the City will make payment directly to the grantee based on the invoices related to the project and the agreement made with Keep Friendswood Beautiful Grant Fund. They must supply Keep Friendswood Beautiful with all records and comply with all requirements of the City.

Deadline for submission is March 15.

Friendswood swimmers shine at state swim meet

The Friendswood boys and girls had a strong showing at the Class 5A state swim meet at the Lee & Joe Jamail Swim Center on the University of Texas campus in Austin.

Georgetown won the 5A boys state championship with 200 points while Frisco Wakeland finished in second place with 186 points and the Friendswood boys finished in third place with 159 points.

Cedar Park won the 5A girls state title with 194 points while the Friendswood girls finished in ninth place with 86 points.

Friendswood had 14 swimmers and one diver who competed in the state swim meet.

They were: Peyton Becker, Olivia Esbeck, Nick Hardt, Edi Jakob, Andi Jeanes, Tony Laurito, Alex Linden, KK LeBlanc, Paige McCray, Marshall Odom, Paul Podrebarac, Lauren Tillman, Erin Voelker, Talon Welch and Grayson Wells for Diving.

The Mustangs also had some record-setting events at the state meet that resulted in multiple swimmers earning medals.

Tony Laurito had a gold medal performance in the 200-yard Individual medley that included a new Class 5A state record 1:47.34. Laurito also won the 100-yard backstroke in 48.98 and he also swam a leg on the third place 200-yard medley relay team with Nick Hardt, Talon Welch, and Marshall Odom with



a time of 1:34.45 for the bronze medal.

Marshall Odom won a gold medal in the 100-yard butterfly with a time of 49.05 while winning a silver medal in the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 20.60. Odom was also on the 200-yard medley relay team that finished in third place.

KK LeBlanc also won two medals for the girls team as she captured a gold medal in the 100-yard freestyle with a time of 49.86 and a silver medal for her second-place finish in the 50-yard freestyle in 23.09.

While Laurito set a new 5A state record in the 200-yard IM, five more FHS records were broken thanks to the efforts of LeBlanc (50yard free; 100-yard free), Laurito (200-yard IM), Odom (100-yard free), and the boys 400yard free relay team.
