

City government:

Bonds decision set for February

Pearland city leaders will decide next month whether to proceed with a bond election in May, and if so, how much.

"My question to council is 'Do we have a good appetite for taking this to the voters in May?" Mayor Kevin Cole asked councilmembers during a discussion last week.

The question drew nods of approval, meaning the next question will be the size and scope.

A bond election is not an all or nothing choice for voters.

"The way we've typically done these, you've got a transportation category, a facilities category. A drainage package would have all the drainage projects in it, "interim City Manager Trent Epperson said. "You would have a drainage ballot initiative and a parks ballot initiative."

"These projects have to be started in a five-year period. That doesn't necessarily mean we're going to have \$120 million sitting in a bank account Day One, paying debt service on it. We're going to sell those bonds over time."

A citizen's drainage bond committee in December presented recommendations to the city that included a list of priority drainage projects totaling \$106 million. The top three projects on the list: \$10.9 million in drainage

Old Town from McLean to Highway 35; and \$14.3 million in Shadycrest and Crook View subdivision drainage improvements, respectively. The list also included \$22.8 million for Harkey Road

upgrade on Veterans; \$10.17 million in the southwest part of

Fall break, transition day part of new AISD calendar

Alvin ISD will be starting earlier next fall, and campuses will get a weeklong fall break in October.

The district's board of trustees on Jan. 10 approved the 2023-24 academic calendar developed through a committee that sought and examined staff and community feedback.

Also included in next year's academic calendar is an "early transition day," created for students new to a campus such as kindergartners, sixth graders and freshmen, with all staff on hand to help them get oriented before other students return.

"A lot of our staff loved the transition day as

well as parents," Superintendent Carol Nelson

The transition day will be Wednesday, Aug. 9, and first day of school for all students on Thursday, Aug. 10. Teachers will return to campuses July 31, while teachers new to the district will report on July 26 for orientation.

The calendar has the following breaks: Fall Break from Oct. 16-20; Thanksgiving break Nov. 20-24; Winter Break Dec. 18 until Jan. 3, 2024, with students returning Jan. 4, 2024, and Spring Break from March 11-15, 2024. Early release days are Dec. 15 and May 24,

Approximately 84 percent of campus staff were in favor of a fall break, Nelson said.

"They understood that it was a trade; they were going to have to start earlier or end later," she told the board. "Then the community survey went out and we 3,197 responses. For fall break, about 1,434 people commented on fall break and 980 of those were positive

comments." The District Education Improvement Committee was led by Alvin ISD administrators and was tasked with collecting data and input from parents and district staff. The committee collaborated over several meetings to create the approved calendar. A community

This past Monday our country celebrated Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. Parades were held, speeches were given... honor rose up all over the country! Dr. King was a voice for 'freedom' and a voice for 'truth.' He knew not just the story of Jesus but the Savior himself. His preaching was powerful, passionate and prophetic... putting his faith and life on the line every day of his public ministry. Many people loved him for this. Some didn't and they killed him for it.

Dr. King was 39 years old when he was shot dead on a hotel balcony in Memphis, TN and people remember him for not only what he said... but also for what he did and that was to bring attention to the great sin of racial injustice and the nation's bigotry toward the black people who live here. Perhaps America's greatest sin is self-deception and a denial of God's truth.

We all try to be good. But...we're not... not as good as we think we are anyway. Yet...we keep telling ourselves... "it's a free country... I can say and do whatever I want! It's in the constitution, right? Or in the Bill of Rights, at least... and for sure... somewhere in the Bible, huh? Well, I suppose it's all there ...somewhere on those pages. Freedom does ring and freedom does exist...but like the song says...
