Bond election 2023

City lays out propositions, to make final decision Feb. 13

In a packed council chamber, Pearland city leaders on Monday hammered out four bond packages to put before voters in a possible bond election May 6.

"I think we had enough people say, 'Let's put the whole thing out there' — it's up to the voters," Mayor Kevin Cole said. "It's going to be broken out by propositions."

Should the council in February decide to proceed with the bond election, four separate propositions are: \$105.5 million in drainage projects, \$10 million in roads, just over \$33 million for parks and just under \$16 million

for public safety.

City residents would be able to vote for none, one, several or all of the propositions.

"You'll have cafeteria style where you can go through and pick and choose," Cole said. "It gives people the opportunity to weigh in on their particular interests."

The council is expected to decide whether to call a May 6 bond election at its Feb. 13 meeting.

Among those who turned out Monday were a large group showing support for expanding soccer facilities to accommodate a program that is bursting at the seams.

"Space is so limited we have to drive to

Houston for practice," Pearland Soccer President Ted Bryan Kalivoda said, detailing how more than 100 players make the drive weekly from Pearland to the Blue Ridge Soccer Park in Houston.

Proposed parks improvements include expansions of facilities at Hickory Slough and Independence parks.

Also discussed Monday were impacts of various levels of bonds on the city's debt service tax rate.

For a \$250,000 home, the tax impact of a \$105 million bond election is estimated to have no annual impact, while \$149.5 million would have a \$12.19 annual impact. A \$181.3 million package would come with an annual cost of \$24.38, city staff said.

However, the maintenance and operation costs of new projects approved would have an impact on the city's general fund once they are built.

Should one or all of the bond packages receive voter approval, design contracts for approved projects would begin to be awarded in July, with the first bond sales not occurring until June 2024.

"The funds (designated for these projects) can't be used for anything else," Councilman Woody Owens said. "You can't say you're going to use it here, and then use it somewhere else."

Council members generally agreed that voters should have a say in the projects.

"If we're going to a vote, let's vote on all of it," Councilman Tony Carbone said.

'Change happens'

City to consider permit for assisted living use

To neighboring residents' dismay, Pearland's Planning and Zoning is recommending city council allow an assisted living facility to operate at 3205 Dixie Farm Road.

"We do have to acknowledge the growing pains within the city and the limited real estate that still remains with Pearland. That rural field isn't necessarily going to be a reality in 2023," P&Z Commissioner Ashlee Boswell said during the Jan. 17 discussion. "There has been a consistent need for (assisted living and memory care)."

In 2020, city council approved a conditional use permit for an assisted living facility at the location, but that permit expired after a year went by without a building permit submitted.

Now the applicant, Friendswood-based G and G Partners Development, is seeking to renew that permit.

Plans for the one-story, 22,000-square-foot facility with memory care are the same as that approved in 2020, according to Chris Heard of GMS Connects LLC, representing the applicant.

At the P&Z discussion, residents of Pine Hollow turned out to voice concern about commercial uses encroaching into residential areas.

"The more allowances we make for commercial, the less value our property is going to have. We have so many assisted living properties already available to us," Valerie Hammond told the board. "I bought in Pearland in '93 because I liked the community. Now, I'm practically in a commercial

zone. I don't think that's what any of us wants."

"It seems like the city is bending over backwards for this property owner," said neighboring resident Greg Nelson. "Putting commercial in is going to devalue these properties."

Angela Ornelas' home backs up to the property.

"We have a lot of concerns about a memory care facility being developed there," she told the P&Z board.

"Patients would be living there 24-7 with all kinds of health issues which would require EMS to be called. Due to the fact this will be 100 yards (from homes) we're concerned about how much sound (it would generate)."

The number of dumpsters required by an assisted living use, drainage and traffic also concern neighbors.

"I live really close to this as well," Commissioner Derrell Isenberg said. "The memory care is not a very intrusive building to be in that area. It's a tough call, but the bottom line is Pearland is growing and that section in Dixie Farm Road is not going to be residential. Something is going to be built there."

Now occupied by a home built in 1963, the 9.6-acre site was zoned neighborhood service in 2017.

"I understand concerns, but change happens," P&Z Commissioner Angela McCathran said. "We have to learn how to adapt with that change."

Pearland City Council will consider granting the conditional use permit at a future meeting.

Driving school permitted for Pearland

A new driving school is coming to Pearland.

Operating in Houston for a dozen years and often serving Pearland residents, Monroy driving school is planning open a location school in the Kingsley Broadway Planned Development District at 3129 Kingsley Drive.

Pearland City Council on Monday granted a conditional use permit that would allow the school to operate in the area, which is zoned as planned development.

Councilman Alex Kamkar moved to require a traffic pattern be required for egress and ingress into the location.

"I don't know how you police it," Mayor Kevin Cole said.

The motion to amend failed and Kamkar cast the lone vote against granting the conditional use permit.

"This is an area that will continue to grow with population," he said. "Putting a lot of untested drivers at this corner just doesn't seem prudent to me."

The business' owners told the council that classroom sessions are in the evenings, and instructors drive beginning students out before they take on larger streets with more traffic.

"I think it's a good business — it's a good use," Cole said.

Planning and Zoning earlier this month recommended approval of the conditional use permit for the family-owned business.

"Everyone here is for it; welcome to Pearland," Planning and Zoning commissioner Henry Fuertes told the Monroys at that meeting.

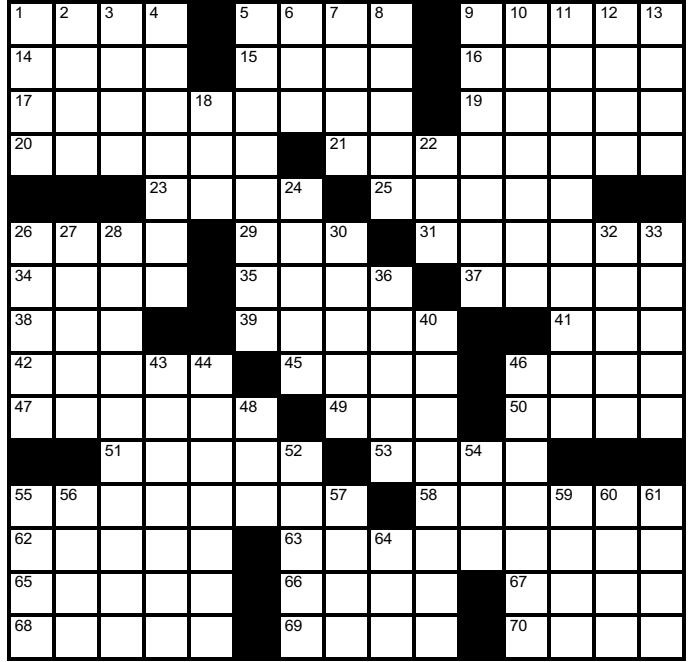

I've been lost before. I've lost my car keys. I've lost my wallet. I've lost days of work due to illness or neglect... but I can never lose my salvation. Word.

PISD pursuing afterschool grants

Lawhon, Harris programs would be no cost to parents

A partnership with the Boys and Girls Club of Brazoria County could provide free after school activities at C.J. Harris Elementary in addition to programs already offered at Lawhon Elementary next fall.

"Lawhon is a renewal of the process, and C. J. Harris is an add," Superintendent Larry Berger said.

Pearland ISD trustees on Jan. 17 unanimously authorized a letter of support to the Texas Education Agency to move forward with the Nita M. Lowery 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant.

The grant-funded programs will be added to the school district's mix of offerings for students after school. Programs at other campuses are provided through a Communities in

Schools of Brazoria County grant at a cost of \$15,000 per year.

Through the Boys and Girls club, programming would be offered at both Lawhon and Harris free of charge to the district and parents.

"We are reviewing all our programs as part of our district initiatives and goals to maximize funds to support our students' needs," Berger told the board.

In the current school year at Harris, the district partners with the YMCA to provide after-school activities at Harris Elementary, but at a cost to parents. As part of the proposed agreement, Pearland ISD will provide in-kind contributions such as campus and facility use, janitorial services, referrals and internet service.

The board also discussed afterschool programming at

Junior High South.

"Part of the issue when you get to the junior high level is the competition with sports, athletics and fine arts," Berger said. "After-school programming doesn't necessarily work at the junior high."

Also on Jan. 17, the school board voted to add a position at Carlestone Elementary.

"We have had increased enrollment, which is good,

but increased enrollment has some side effects late in the school year," Berger said.

Kindergarten enrollment at the campus has continued to increase, he said.

Since dividing classrooms late in the year is not welcome by parents, students or staff, the district opted to add a paraprofessional position to assist with the current three classes of kindergartners.

FEF awards over \$46,000 at Legacy Grant SurPrize Patrol

The Friendswood ISD Education Foundation (FEF) recently awarded FISD with more than \$46,000 in grants during its inaugural Legacy Grant SurPrize Patrol.

FEF launched the Legacy Grant Program for the 2022-2023 school year in response to an increasing demand for grants that go beyond the \$5,000 threshold set by the Adopt-a-Grant program. Legacy Grants are designed to go beyond traditional grants size, scope and impact with costs being between \$5,000 and \$40,000.

"More and more often, we have teachers coming to us with a dream that is bigger than what we could previously accommodate with Adopt-a-Grant," FEF Executive Director Ashley Adair said. "We had to find a way to fund these grants that aim to achieve a transformative impact by engaging students with new or extraordinary learning experiences."

Per FEF's updated Investment Policy Statement, 3% of FEF'S endowment fund will be pulled each year to fund Legacy Grants. The endowment currently sits around \$1.5 million and continues to grow with the support of FEF's Century Club members.

According to FEF Grant Committee Chair Kelly Lovell, the team had no idea how many applications to expect in the inaugural year.

"We were blown away when we received 15 grants totaling more than \$200,000," Lovell said. "Each grant was worthy of funding which made the committee's job very challenging."

After reviewing the submissions, seven

applicants were invited to present their projects in person and answer questions. Of those that presented, three were selected for funding and those teachers were informed with a surprise visit from FEF and the Friendswood High School (FHS) drumline on Dec. 14.

Grant recipients include Westwood Media Integration Specialist Elizabeth Henning who was awarded \$8,488.99 for a book vending machine, Friendswood Junior High Robotics Teacher PJ Givens who was awarded \$23,700.00 to fund the Robotics Vex IQ Classroom and FHS Art Teacher Mandy Harris who was awarded \$13,994.65 to start a ceramics program at FHS.

"I can not thank the Education Foundation enough for letting us dream for our art students at FHS," Harris said. "This gift of a ceramics program for our students is something I have dreamed of for years."

Givens shared that after working in FISD for 23 years, it never ceases to amaze him how much support is received from the parents and community of Friendswood.

"When I was presented with the grant, I was nothing short of shocked and speechless," Givens said. "The support of the FJH robotics program is overwhelming and will make a difference in students' lives for years to come."
