

No hike in homestead exemptions for now

Now is not the time to increase Pearland's homestead exemption, city leaders agreed during a workshop Monday.

"We're still dealing with the tax calculation worksheet error and what that did to our tax rate and how that affects this next year," Mayor Kevin Cole said, referring to a miscalculation resulting in a budget shortfall. "Making this change on top of really not knowing how that's going to affect us, and we don't get our taxable values until the end of July, it's a moving target."

After holding a workshop discussion Monday on the possibility of raising the homestead exemption above the city's current 2.5 percent, the majority of the council agreed to hold off doing so for the upcoming fiscal year.

Increasing the homeowner exception will also increase the no new revenue rate - the tax rate that generates the same money from the same properties taxed the year before, city staff advised.

"It's increasing the tax rate on businesses,"

City Manager Trent Epperson told the council. "But even the residential exempted properties — while they would get a bigger exemption, they would see the tax rate rise to generate the same amount of revenue."

Most on the council were not comfortable with the added burden on businesses.

"We're crippling businesses as it is with the way we bill water and charge more for businesses for the water they consume," Councilman Tony Carbone said. "Next year after we get the tax worksheets correct, I'm fine having the discussion at that point, once we get some solid ground under our feet."

Pearland has an estimated 30,363 homesteads and an average appraised value of \$297,000. Increasing the homestead exemption to 10 percent would save \$14 per year off the average bill, and 20 percent would decrease the average city tax bill by \$38.

"At some point we have to have a discussion on how much is a business willing to take until they break?" asked Councilman Rushi Patel. "I'm not a fan of this. Certainly, we can look at it down the line, but it's not going to be this month."

Councilman Adrian Hernandez supported an incremental approach.

"Five percent to me has always seemed like a reasonable first-step approach to see how we work in that environment," he said. "Moving into five and think about what 10 percent would look like three years from now - I would be comfortable with that. I'm just one person."

A homestead exemption change requires an ordinance change.

"We've got a lot of moving pieces associated with the tax rate and what we're facing moving into this next budget," Epperson said. "Our recommendation is to wait and put a longer-term plan in place if we want to increase homestead exemption."





"Moses came with Joshua, son of Nun and spoke all the words of this song in the hearing of the people. When Moses finished reciting these words to all Israel, **46** he said to them, 'Take to heart all the words I have solemnly declared to you this day, so that you may command your children to obey carefully all the words of this law. **47** They are not just idle words for you—they are your life. By them you will live long in the land you are crossing the Jordan to possess." -Deuteronomy 32:44-47

Families and individuals have been sharing words to live by since there were people around to listen and share... you know... it's the attitude something isn't a mistake until it's done a second or third time... as the first time marks the learning curve for what is still to come. It goes way back with words of caution like...

"Don't get too near to the water's edge... there's alligators close by" ... or "stay away from that sinkhole... it seems to get bigger and bigger everyday"... or when God said the that first man and woman... 'you can eat from any tree in the garden... except the one in the center which exposes you to what God knows... the difference between both good and evil.' Even from the very beginning people have been dismissing God and the good things God has said to us...

And what's interesting is God only asks we take one day a week to set aside time to keep that relationship intact. The other commandments are about how we treat one another and how we live in community and are words to live by offering not just instruction, but protection and goodness... and I tried to teach teenagers the ten commandments are like a mirror... showing us how we really are rather than how we think and feel we are... and like the curb on the road to keep us from going into the life's deep ditches and like a measuring stick to show us how far we can go before we get into trouble... and where I come from... nobody I know likes trouble! Even the task of honoring mothers and fathers is good because they may be only doing the best they can.

The catch is this... the ten commandments are words all of us can live by... to be taught to each generation... and I must say over the years I have been with many young children who could name Santa's eight tiny reindeer or all of the Smurfs but could not tell me even three or four of the ten commandments... ones which bring a centering to life reindeer or small blue cartoon men could ever provide.

Words to live by guide our moments and days. Claim some. Share some. Faith matters. It does.

Katy ended the scoring threat as Moya struck out and Castaneda hit into an inning-ending double play.



That's why laughter is truly a cure for life's illnesses. While we don't laugh during tragedy...there are many things in life that we can smile about while we are facing the stress mess of life.







The UT-Arlington signee would also get the win in the state title game over Denton Guyer 4-2 as she allowed five hits and struck out six batters in a complete game performance. to left field allowing another run for a 3-1 advantage.

Gutierrez (25-1) allowed three hits, two runs, while striking out five and walking two.

The Lady Oilers managed only one hit by junior third baseman Raenna Liscano, a double in the six inning, while taking advantage of five walks, a wild pitch, and an error.

No. 3 state-ranked Pearland faced the No. 1 team in Class 6A in the Denton Ryan Lady Wildcats with the winning team claiming the 2023 6A state championship.

As they did in the semifinals, the Lady Oilers found themselves trailing after the first half of the opening inning 2-0 after Guyer, quickly grabbed the lead in the top

"We live for this, and this is what we've been working for the past four years," Golden said. "With my seniors, we were the group to do it, and it's just so exciting."

That was enough support for Pearland pitcher Abigail Gutierrez, who allowed five hits and struck out six batters as she tossed a complete game for the second straight game. The UT-Arlington signee also pitched well during the Oilers' 3-2 semifinal victory against San Benito.

"They're just always so hype," Gutierrez said as her teammates celebrated with the championship trophy nearby. "I know they just always have my back no matter what happens. I can count on these girls in any situation."

Pearland finished the season with an impressive 41-3 record.

The following seniors certainly left their mark for Pearland. They are Hailey Golden, Lydia Njus, Gabbie Roundtree, Kristyn Whitlock, Darian DeLeon, Kennedy Drafton, and Abigail Gutierrez.
