

Coming soon: Cultural arts master plan

Pearland is getting its first-ever cultural arts master plan.

"I know people in the community who thought we've been neglecting the arts for a while," Councilwoman Layni Cade said. "I love this idea."

Funded through the Pearland Convention and Visitors Bureau by a portion of hotel occupancy tax, the cultural arts plan was a need identified during a 2021 listening tour involving feedback from arts-related organizations both in and around Pearland.

"We did about 26 to 28 meetings. We met with people from visual arts, performing arts. We met with different community groups to see what they were involved in and how they moved their communities forward," said Mayor Kevin Cole. "Mayor Emeritus Tom Reid poured his heart in the arts and culture

community. And it became very evident what he didn't have is a roadmap of where we want to go."

City Council on Monday unanimously approved a \$89,840 contract with Cultural Planning Group, a San Diego, Calif.-based consulting firm that has done similar plans around the country including for the City of Houston in 2015.

"We want to identify and pay special attention to what your competitive advantages are for cultural tourism, and that comes back to your location," said the firm's co-founder David Plettner-Saunders.

"I'm very excited. I think we need to have a plan," Councilman Alex Kamkar said. "I think if we have a plan, we'll start working on it."

The plan takes about nine months to complete. The process will begin with a kickoff meeting and establishing a steering committee of local stakeholders.

Last fall, an agenda item to award the contract to the firm Asakura Robinson failed 2-4.

project on horizon

Approximately \$2.6 million in grant funding is set to be used for drainage ditch improvements along Garden Road, O'Day Road, Woody and Scott Lane.

The General Land Office is expected to release the funding for the work later this month, staff said. The project will widen and deepen roadside drainage ditches and replace culverts to increase the flow and volume of stormwater runoff.

A required environmental assessment for the project is under way, special projects administrator Joel Hardy said

during a public hearing, another required step, held Monday night. The public hearing drew no speakers.

"Once this work is complete, the natural vegetation of that area will be restored," he told the council.

Much of the work will be located in the floodplain.

"We are going to be widening ditches and increasing the size of culverts. That will benefit the community and cause no harm to the environment," Hardy said. "These ditches are generally dry. They don't hold water."

After funds are released, a permitting process takes about 45 days.

Middle-schooler faces weapon charges

An on-campus incident has resulted in criminal charges against a Pearland middle school student.

Pearland Police responded to Sablatura Middle School, 2201 N. Galveston Avenue, at 8:37 a.m. Feb. 28 regarding a student in possession of a firearm.

The youngster with the weapon was quick-

ly reported, and the firearm was recovered, Pearland ISD officials said.

District policies require students caught on campus with firearms to be expelled.

The student, who is not identified due to his or her age, has also been charged with possession of a firearm in a prohibited place and terroristic threat. The campus serves fifth and sixth-graders, students who are typically age 10 to 12.

"As always, we encourage your student to talk to a teacher, school administrator or other trusted adult any time he or she hears or sees anything out of the ordinary," Sablatura Middle School Principal Verna Tipton said in an email sent to parents the day of the incident.

Lady Oilers fall short in the 6A state semifinals

For the first time in 43 years, the Pearland Lady Oilers found themselves playing in the 6A state semifinal basketball tournament against the two-time defending state champion Desoto Lady Eagles.

Pearland beat the Summer Creek Lady Bulldogs for the 6A Region III crown to avenge a loss to the Lady Bulldogs last season in the region finals. The win this year sent the Lady Oilers to the Alamodome in San Antonio to the 6A state tournament.

Second-year coach Jere' Adams saw her girls win 35 of 39 games this season while going undefeated in district action at 12-0 to claim the league crown. Pearland is 63-14 over the past two seasons as they were 28-10 in 2021-2022.

No matter the outcome of the game, Coach Adams, her coaching staff, and her girls have much to be proud of on this historical season as they have accomplished something that hasn't been done in 43 years when the Pearland girls advanced to the state basketball tournament in 1980. In the game against Desoto, the Lady Eagles were competing for a third straight state championship, and they had also played in the final four in 2019 as well. The game between the two teams was close for the first half of the first quarter until Desoto made a late run to take a 15-11 lead into the second period.

Second-half meltdown dooms **Dawson from the playoffs**

If someone wrote a story about the third-round game between the Dawson Eagles and the Clear Falls Eagles they might be tempted to name it, "The Tale of Two Halves" after Clear Falls defeated Dawson 54-45.

Dawson (31-6), who won the District 23-6A title was facing Clear Falls (27-7) who were crowned District 24-6A champions.

Dawson took charge after getting the opening tipoff to take a 10-6 first quarter lead thanks to 3-pointers by Devan Brown and Braylon Howard while also getting a pair of short jumpers from Kendrick Bailey.

Clear Falls struggled against the hard-pressing Daw-

son defense and managed to get three field goals in the opening eight minutes.

Things didn't get any better for the Eagles as Dawson raised their intensity offensively while still applying defensive pressure that allowed an anemic seven points while Dawson went on an 18-point scoring spree for a 28-13 lead at intermission at Pasadena Memorial High School.

One might wonder what halftime speech Knights Coach Bryan Shelton gave to his players in the locker room.

"We talked about some sets that would work and defensive schemes we could possibly pull off," Shelton said. "We just needed a few good plays to happen early

The Pearland Lady Oilers are currently 19-2 overall and 2-0 in district while the latest poll has them as the No. 2 Class 6A team in the state.

Pearland head coach Laneigh Clark begins her 26th season at the helm of the Lady Oilers softball program and is the winningest coach in Class 6A history in Texas and began this season with a 647-224-5 record. Counting her high school record in Louisiana, Clark has more that 700 career wins. Clark was inducted into the Texas Girls Coaches Association Hall of Fame in July of 2021.

Pearland made a run to the 2022 state softball tournament but fell short when they were swept by the Deer Park Lady Deer in the Class 6A Region III finals.

The Lady Deer advanced to the 2022 state tournament with a 40-4 mark while Pearland closed out their season at 32-10. That means both teams combined for a 72-14 record in 2022.

Pearland has won two state titles in 1996 and 2010 while also advancing to state in 2009 and 2011.

The top three returning players for Pearland with the highest batting average from that team include: Senior outfielder and Texas A&M signee Hailey Golden who slashed .625/.674/.741 with 75 hits, 24 RBI, 61 runs and 37 stolen bases.

Senior infielder Kristyn Whitlock batted .457 with 53 hits, 51 RBI, 32 runs and six home runs (team leader) and senior outfielder Kennedy Drafton hit .547 with 41 hits, 37 RBI, 31 runs and 15 stolen bases. Junior Raenna Liscano batted .377 with 40 hits, 44 RBI and 32 runs as a sophomore.

On the mound, senior Abigail Gutierrez returns after posting a 14-1 record with an .096 ERA and 119 strikeouts while Isela Flores went 12-3 with a 3.98 ERA and 64 strikeouts as a freshman.
