Epperson named city manager

Pearland City Council on Monday returned from a 47minute closed session and voted unanimously to appoint Trent Epperson as the new city manager effective immediately.

An employee of the City of Pearland for nearly 17 years, Epperson had been serving as interim city manager since November 2022 when city council fired then city manager Clay Pearson. Pearson had served as the city manager since March 2014.

Epperson began his role with the city as director of project management and director of engineering and capital projects, moving to assistant city manager and most recently to deputy city manager before assuming the interim

Appointed by the city council, the city manager serves as the chief executive officer for the city and is responsible for management of staff, budgeting and administering city ordinances and policies.

Pearland's city manager position had been opened to outside candidates through the search Strategic Government Resources.

ISD elections:

Voters support incumbents on school boards

Pearland ISD voters turned out to support incumbent Trustee Kristofer Schoeffler, who secured more than 72 percent of the vote, according to unofficial results released by Brazoria County.

Schoeffler, who held a narrow lead in early voting results, received a total of 2,725 votes vs. 1,049 for opponent Steve Bumgardner. Results are considered "unofficial" until they are canvassed by the board, usually about a week after the election.

Trustee Toni Carter did not face an opponent. The seven members of the board serve three-year

terms and are all elected at large. In Alvin ISD, unofficial results show incumbent Trustee Earl Humbird with the lead for position No. 6. Humbird had 2,534 votes vs. 2,009 cast for his oppo-

nent Craig L. Kettler.

Councilman reprimanded over emails Bv N. BRADFORD

The meeting after his re-election, Pearland Councilman Alex Kamkar drew a public reprimand from fellow council members Monday for releasing confidential information about the recent city

"This reinforces why it's important for us to have (closed) sessions," Councilman Adrian Hernandez said. "There are honest repercussions that come from release of information."

The reprimand stems from emails reportedly sent by Kamkar April 23 to the members of the Pearland Police Officers Association that contained confidential information about candidates for city man-

"He knew this was information he should not be releasing but did in fact release it," Cole said.

After the search was narrowed from five to two candidates, the council decided not to name them as finalists "until we got through the elections," Cole

The mayor said he learned that the Texas

Municipal Police Officers Association had been contacted to do a background check on one of the candidates that had not yet been named. That candidate later withdrew.

"Clearly the information was out there," Cole said. "We hadn't named our finalists yet." Kamkar cited his own issues with the city manag-

er selection process. There was little confidentiality to begin with, he said. "The last city manager was bad for police," he

said. "The reality is I did not want to see them kicked around by a person or persons we don't know. I'm more than happy to take my lumps. If supporting police to get a good city manager is wrong, I don't want to be right." With city manager searches, Cole said, releasing

names of applicants before naming finalists can be detrimental to those candidates' current employ-

"This about accountability for the actions of one," Cole said. "This is not about the police officers involved. They did not solicit this informa-

All four City of Pearland bond propositions totaling approximately \$181.3 million received voter approval, according to unofficial results released by Brazoria County. Drawing the most support from voters was

Proposition A, which designates \$105.5 million for drainage projects. About 65 percent of voters backed Proposition A, or 3,283 vote for vs. 1,759

Proposition B, calling for \$26.14 million for city streets, bridges and sidewalks, drew support of 64 percent of voters, or 3,227 ballots vs. 1,802 against. Proposition C, designating \$33.7 million for

parks and recreation including expansions to sports

in support of the parks bonds, vs. 2,443 against. Proposition D, which designates \$15.96 million for construction and repair Fire Station No. 7, drew support of more than 62 percent of voters, or 3,129

percent of voters. A total of 2,575 ballots were cast

"for" votes vs. 1,879 against. In two Pearland City Council races, Position No. 3 incumbent Alex Kamkar handily defeated chal-

lenger Jai Daggett 3,291 to 1,658. In the race to succeed retiring councilman Woody

Owens for Position 7, Rushi Patel garnered more than 57 percent of ballots vs. 42 percent cast for opponent Antonio Johnson.

A mixed-use development with retail and townhomes is proposed for the corner of Cullen Parkway and Fite Road.

"We feel it's a good spot for a more transitional

type development between the higher intensity uses along Broadway and predominantly single family uses to the south," said Jeff Boutte, director of planning and land development for Houston-based Windrose Land Services.

Pearland City Council at a future meeting is expected to address a zone change needed for the development to move forward.

Windrose Land Services is seeking a zone change to from general business to planned development for the site at the northeast corner of Cullen Parkway and Fite Road, about half a mile from Broadway St. Plans call for 109 townhomes for sale plus 4.4 acres of green space with a retail component. A six-foot screening wall is also planned to separate the townhomes from adjacent properties.

Various portions of the property have been rezoned for similar uses in the past, but it remains

undeveloped. "This site has had a lot of challenges over the years", Planning and Zoning Commissioner Ashlee

Boswell said during the May 1 P&Z meeting. Boswell did note the 109-

townhome plan seemed "compact." "I would be in favor of the

After a lengthy discussion and hearing from six neighboring residents, P&Z Commission voted to


recommend the zoning change to city council. "One of the common things that keeps coming up from the school district superintendents is they cannot attract teachers here because they can't afford to buy a house," Planning and Zoning Commissioner Jennifer Hendrichs commented. "I see this project as possibly a way for them to afford to live here. They want to live where they teach. We need to keep that in mind going forward."



City bundles technology systems

Pearland city leaders on April 24 approved a three-year three-year technology platforms contract at an estimated cost of \$620,500 per year.

"The systems consolidate multiple technologies under one new, three-year subscription,"




Paulson had given the Knights the lead in the first with a hit that scored Matt Novominsky.





Wilson also got some star power help from her battery mate Charleigh Esparza who threw out a couple of Lamar Consolidated base run-



The Texas Louisiana Gulf Coast District Exchange Club hosted their 53rd Annual Crime Prevention Luncheon. 15 officers from the surrounding departments were honored for going above and beyond with their contributions to their community.

Officer Finch is one of the department's DDACTS Officers (workflow is self-generated), Bike Patrol Officer, Bicycle Fleet Mechanic, and Swift Water Rescue Technician. While serving in those capacities, Officer Finch has distinguished himself as one that goes above and beyond the call of duty. Officer Finch's work ethic, professionalism, character, and dedication to the self-initiating and proactive DDACTS unit is exemplary and in keeping with the highest traditions and standards of the Pearland Police Department. During 2022, Officer Finch conducted 520 traffic stops and completed 114 offense reports. These interactions led to 60 arrests and 82 criminal charges (35 felony and 47 misdemeanor non-citation). Officer Finch also issued 66 criminal and traffic misdemeanor citations. The equation of 1 in 6 of Officer Finch's initiated contacts resulting in a criminal charge (non-citation) is a testament to Officer Finch's job knowledge and situational acumen.

Due to Officer Finch being assigned to the Bike Patrol and Swift Water Rescue Team, Officer Finch is often away from his primary assignment for weeks at a time, and is still able to produce significant work performance data.

Furthermore, Officer Finch does a significant amount of Bike Patrol duties performing routine maintenance and casualty repairs for the department's fleet of 21 bicycles, including building 4 new bicycles received by the department this year. Officer Finch also assists International Police Mountain Bike Association Basic Police Cyclist Courses as a bicycle mechanic during the week-long courses which can consist of up to 30 cyclists, fixing recurrent break-downs during the courses.

In May of this year Officer Finch was one of four officers to volunteer to assist the City of Uvalde, TX in patrol and crowd control operations for four days and nights following a highly publicized and criticized tragic incident.

Officer Finch also coordinates a website, txblueline.com,
