Study to examine jail capacity

A needs assessment to be completed on the Brazoria County Detention Center will determine how the county can most affordably accommodate an increasing inmate population.

"Two years ago, we were at 717 inmates," County Judge Matt Sebesta said. "We've been running over 1,000. Once we get the needs assessment and we where we are at, we may be looking at a significant investment in the detention facility."

County Commissioners on Sept. 27 voted to advertise for proposals for an assessment and appointed a committee to review proposals. The county jail is located near Angleton.

"The inmate population can vary from day to day, but we are at 927 currently," Sheriff Bo Stallman told commissioners last Tuesday.

The needs assessment is set to be funded through American Rescue Plan Act monies.

Jails are inspected regularly by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, which lists the Brazoria County facility's top capacity at 1,170.

Once a jail reaches capacity, inmates must be transferred to another jail that has space and housed there at the home county's expense.

City considers limiting budget changes

As the new fiscal year begins, Pearland City Council is looking at tightening up its financial policies, specifically restricting how many times the city's budget can be amended.

Before each new fiscal year begins on Oct. 1, the city adopts an annual budget that balances revenues and expenses, and the city largely adheres to those numbers, with exceptions being brought back to city council as budget amendments. Looking back over a year marked by supply chain issues and inflation, the amount of budget amendments over the recently ended fiscal year is an area of concern.

"Historically, we've only had two budget

amendments every year, but this last year, we had six. It bothers me we are continually amending a budget," Mayor Kevin Cole said. "I don't think that's how you should run your business; I certainly don't think that's how we should be managing our budgets."

The last fiscal year's budget increased expenses by \$7.4 million and by almost \$5.4 million in revenue, Cole said.

"We were doing this literally every other month through June," he said.

The council is considering limiting the number of amendments to two per year, with exceptions in an emergency declared by three-quarters of city council. In Pearland's case, it would require six of seven votes.

"If you feel the interest of the public safety, health, welfare that you is so important that you're going to pass it as a once and only reading," City Attorney Darrin Coker told the council, "then the courts have ruled that it's at your discretion as a body if the majority of you believe it is an emergency."

The rest of the council and staff seemed largely receptive of the suggestion, which was held for discussion only. The change to the policy will likely be up for a vote at a future meeting.

NOTICE OF VOTE ON TAX RATE

If the district adopts a combined debt service, operation and maintenance and contract tax rate that would result in the taxes on the average residence homestead increasing by more than 3.5 percent, an election must be held to determine whether to approve the operation and maintenance tax rate under Section 49.23602, Water Code.

The 86th Texas Legislature modified the manner in which the voter-approval tax rate is calculated to limit the rate of growth of property taxes in the state.

CCISD continues streak of tax rate reductions

The Clear Creek ISD Board of Trustees adopted the 2022 tax rate during the September Regular Meeting, which is the lowest tax rate in more than 30 years. The total adopted rate is \$1.1146 per \$100 taxable value, which is a decrease of 6.51 cents from last year.

The tax rate consists of two components, the maintenance and operations tax rate of \$.8446 and the interest and sinking tax rate of \$.027. The maintenance and operations rate, which is about a 4.51-cent reduction from 2021, is a result of the Texas Education Agency's Maximum Compressed Rate calculation and is at the lowest possible rate without incurring financial penalties. There is also a 2-cent reduction in the interest and sinking rate from last year.

Taxable property values have seen an increase of 10% from last year. This year, Texas voters approved an increase in the state homestead exemption from \$25,000 to \$40,000. This is in addition to the 5% local homestead exemption provided by CCISD. This year's tax levy on an average residence in CCISD will be reduced by \$17.51.

Dawson blanks Alief Taylor 24-0 for Homecoming victory

The Dawson Eagles celebrated Homecoming with a 24-0 win over the Alief Taylor Lions while also honoring the 2009 Dawson team that advanced to the Class 4A state semifinals in only their second year of varsity football competition.

While the Eagles lost to Austin Lake Travis, who went on to win the 4A state title that season, former head coach Eric Wells and his chargers had established a winning tradition for the fledgling school.

Dawson has never had a losing season and they've never missed the playoffs which started in 2008. And that has continued under current head coach Mike Allison, who was the

defensive coordinator under Wells when Dawson opened in 2007.

The Eagles (2-3, 2-0) lost their first three non-district games against some very good teams, but they have since rebounded with two straight District 23-6A wins over Alief Hastings and Alief Taylor for a 2-0 mark in the league standings. They are tied atop the district with Shadow Creek who is also at 2-0.

Dawson fumbled to Taylor on their first possession of the game, but blocked a 30-yard field goal attempt by Taylor who had advanced to the Eagles 13.

That defensive stand gave the Dawson offense some momentum as the Eagles took possession at their own 24. Bryce Burgess got the offense going with an 18-yard run to the 42. Burgess concluded the 78-yard, 11-play scoring drive with a 3-yard touchdown run. Aaron Jensen tacked on the PAT for a 7-0 lead with 3:31 left in the opening quarter.

The Dawson defense quickly got the ball back as Jackson Cody recovered a fumble by the Lions at the Dawson 21.

The Eagles went on a 10-play, 59-yard drive that stalled at the Lions 20. Ayden Treadway promptly booted a 37-yard field goal with 9:17 remaining in the second period for a 10-

0 lead.

Dawson would add one more score in the first half when quarterback Colin Johnson would toss an 8-yard scoring pass to Kenneth Stroman with 2:17 remaining in the second quarter. Treadway added the PAT, and the Eagles had a 17-0 lead at intermission.

The second half would see only one more score as Dawson crossed the pay station on a 4-yard scoring run by Bryce Burgess with 4:12 left in the third. Treadway added the PAT, and the Eagles posted the 24-0 final score as neither team scored in the final period.

Johnson finished the game hitting 17-of-26 passes for 177 yards and one TD while rushing for 24 yards on five carries.

Bryce Burgess had 14 carries for 100 yards and one touchdown while catching three passes for 17 yards.

Leading receivers included Josh Gillis-Harry (2-59 yards), Jaeden McCleskey (2-37 yards), Stroman (3-34 yards, 1 TD), and Joseph Brown (5-28 yards).

Friendswood rallies to beat Magnolia 41-37

Friendswood was a pre-season pick to finish sixth in the district standings which would mean they would miss the 2022 playoffs.

Magnolia was a pre-season fifth place pick to finish just ahead of Friendswood, but they, too, would be staying home for the post-season.

With the top four teams in the district ranked among the top 10 teams in the Houston area, Friendswood head coach knows his team must concentrate on one game at a time to climb the playoff ladder.

But Koopmann also faced another challenge before facing Magnolia and that was having to find a replacement for his two top quarterbacks who were both injured. That meant that junior varsity sophomore quarterback Mikey Butler had to step up to the varsity in place of Brook Foster and Matthew Dupuis.

Butler accepted the challenge and came up with a big performance like a veteran.

Of course, he got a lot of help on offense and the Friendswood defense also made big plays to help the Mustangs get the 41-37 district win to keep the playoff hopes alive with a 2-2 league mark and 3-3 overall.

Friendswood led 14-13 after the opening quarter as running back Walker Winters scored the game's first touchdown on a 5-yard run for a 7-0

lead following the PAT by Reagan Rudolph with 7:08 left in the first period.

After Magnolia tied up the game on a 1-yard scoring run while missing the PAT, the Mustangs immediately reclaimed the lead as Winters took the ensuing kickoff 85-yards for a sensational touchdown to give Friendswood a 14-6 lead with 4:34 remaining in the opening quarter.

Magnolia closed the gap with another 1-yard scoring plunge making the score 14-13 following the PAT.

Friendswood continued the back-and-forth contest with a score in the second quarter. With 10:13 left, Jackson Rhodes scored on a 19-yard run. Rudolph tacked on the PAT for a 21-13 advantage.

But Magnolia scored on a 27-yard run and got a 35-yard field goal to close out the first half for a 23-21 lead at intermission.

Magnolia continued the momentum in the first half and scored in the third quarter on a 13-yard pass to make the score 30-21.

The Mustangs got another touchdown from Winters on a 4-yard run to cut the lead to 30-28 with 4:42 left in the third quarter.

Friendswood scored again with 11:29 remaining in the final period as Winters got loose for his fourth score of the game on a 43-yard run. The two-point conversion was no good and Friendswood had a slim 34-30 lead.

The Bulldogs added another score with 6:41 left in the contest for a 37-34 lead on a 4-yard scoring run.

With 3:43 left in the game and ball on the Friendswood five-yard line, Butler stepped up like a veteran, converting a third-and-2 with a 4-yard keeper, then finding Hunter Smyrl with a 15-yard completion that moved the ball out to the 32 with 1:40 remaining.

The Mustangs then went for the big play and found it when Butler connected with Aiden Stokes on a 68-yard touchdown strike.

The extra point gave Friendswood a four-point lead with 1:30 left on the clock.

Magnolia got the ball back with 1:30 left in the game, but the defense came up with a big third down sack and a pass incomplection to get the 41-37 win.

Butler finished his first varsity game hitting 12-of-25 passing for 152 yards and one score.

Rhodes had 19 carries for 98 yards and one score while Winters had nine totes for 62 yards and four TDs.

Stokes had one catch for 68 yards and a touchdown while Crowson had two catches for 34 yards and Koopmann had three grabs for 22 yards.

Friendswood will travel to Fulshear to face the Chargers on Saturday, Oct. 8 at 11:00 a.m.
