City OKs 1st readings of zone changes

Pearland City Council on Sept. 12 approved first readings of two zoning changes, including a an area where a developer wants to build townhomes instead of retail.

In the Westwood Village Subdivision, the owner of four tracts at McLean Road and Springfield Avenue wants to change the zoning from general business to townhome district.

A preliminary plan calls for six townhome units of roughly 1,400 square feet. The area is surrounded by single family homes.

A nearby resident spoke in favor of changing the zoning to residential. Planning and Zoning in August voted to recommend the zone change 4-1. City Council on Tuesday approved the first reading 4-3.

Also on Sept. 12, the council unanimously approved the first reading of a request to rezone 5 acres on Hatfield Road from general business to single family residential.

Located on the east of Hatfield Road south of Fite Road, the site is surrounded by single family homes, mobile homes and detention ponds. A public hearing drew no speakers.

County, school districts set tax rates

Brazoria County, Pearland and Alvin ISDs all adopted property tax rates Sept. 13 for the fiscal year that

begins Oct. 1. Hard hit by inflation and fuel costs, the county budget includes a 4% cost-of-living increases for county employees but provides for only four out of 59 new positions requested by various department heads.

County Commissioners originally proposed a tax rate of 35.52 cents per \$100 of value rate - about a penny above the calculated no-new-revenue rate, which adjusts for rising property values.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Stacy Adams moved to amend the rate to be equal to the no-new-revenue rate of 34.1 cents per \$100, and that the county use funding reserves to make up the difference to balance the budget.

"We've been 13 years at the effective - or now called the (no-new-revenue) rate," Precinct 3 Adams said. "But for the inflation, we probably would have made this through without a deficit budget.

"Whether it's raining or not, certainly the clouds are dark," he said. "It's not a good time in a lot of people's worlds, who are on fixed incomes, with inflation being what it is."

Adam's motion to use the no-new-revenue rate passed 4 to 1, with Commissioner Donald Payne voting no.

Public hearings on the county budget and tax rate drew no speakers.

Pearland ISD Trustees on Sept. 13 adopted a total tax rate of \$1.30 cents per \$100 of assessed value, down from the current year's rate of \$1.13.

"This is the lowest rate we've had in more than 30 years," the district's Chief Financial Officer Jorgannie Carter told the board. "Property values have undoubtedly grown, and taxpayers who don't have a homestead exemption, even though the tax rate is decreasing, they will see \$158 (average) increase."

Those with a homestead exemption will see an average savings of \$34.

Alvin ISD

The Alvin ISD on Sept. 13 adopted the 2022-23 tax rate \$1.37 per \$100.

The new rate is a 2-cent reduction over the current

P&Z rules on planned developments

Renewed plans for an age-inplace development proposed off Pearland Parkway will come before City Council soon, with some changes.

A planned development is a type of zoning that often mixes uses and requires a specific site plan be approved.

The 62 acres in the 3900 block of Pearland Parkway had already been zoned as a planned development, but since Hurricane Harvey and the COVID-19 pandemic unfolded since, that zoning classification had expired before a site plan was done.

On Monday, however, the city's Planning and Zoning Commission forwarded a recommendation to reinstate zoning for the French Quarter Planned Development, and allow the developer to move forward with a slate of amendments to the plan.

The development is a mix of uses, with all of the residential component to be age-restricted.

The amended plan calls for 90 independent living, 36 duplexstyle cottages, 63 assisted living and 29 memory care units.

"The main change is we moved from single family residential lots to what we call cottages north of that industrial ditch," said Justin Barnett, spokesman for Triangle 31 Properties LLC. "They will be part of the senior living facilities. They will be rentals."

The changes are a result of working with the drainage district, he said, as well as creating one cohesive age-restricted community.

"The whole idea of this is age in place," he said.

Also on Monday, Planning and Zoning voted 5-0 to recommend a zone change for just under 80 acres south of Old Massey Ranch Road and West of McLean Road from residential estate to a planned development — to become part of the existing Massey Oaks Planned Development.

Proposed are three-bedroom duplex homes with shared driveways among four units. Prices for the homes start at \$310,000 and the builder is Chesmar Homes.

Planning and Zoning recommendations from Monday will likely come before city council at its Oct. 10 meeting.

PISD tables talk on library books

A planned school board discussion on school library procedures in Pearland ISD has been moved to October.

"After some updates from (Superintendent Larry Berger) we're going to push that back to the October agenda, so we can clarify and get more in the procedure report for the board," Trustee Sean Murphy said during the school board's Sept. 13 meeting.

After a discussion on recent concerns on library books at the August meeting, board members agreed to look at tweaking the district's school library policy regarding parent notification on

material checked out, as well as who is appointed to review committees that are assigned to weigh in on book challenges.

Pearland ISD uses guidelines from the Texas Association of School Boards. That policy allows parents or community members to challenge books as inappropriate, triggering a committee review.

While Houston area districts such as Katy and Spring Branch have seen flurries of challenges over controversial library books in schools, Pearland ISD has reported no formal challenges.

The board's next regular meeting is scheduled for 5 p.m. Oct. 11 in the Gant Education Support Center, 1928 Main St.

And the games for the Mustangs will only get tougher as the season progresses making each game that more important.

"To come in here (Friendswood) and win was big," Manvel coach Kevin Hall said. "It gets us back into a better place in the district standings and our goal is to get in the playoffs."

Manvel kicker Chase Cross gave the Mavs the early lead after hitting a 25-yard field goal with 8:37 left in the opening quarter to make the score 3-0 on Manvel's first possession of the game.

The Mavs used a 7-play, 64-yard drive that stalled at the Friendswood eight-yard line that forced the field goal.

Friendswood's offense was basically ineffective throughout the first half while suffering two turnovers that Manvel turned into touchdowns.

With 5:00 left in the second quarter, the Mustangs began their fifth possession of the first half, but fumbled to the Mavs on the first play at their own 10-yard line which was recovered by Steve Polk.

It took only two plays as Andrew Riley scooted into the Friendswood end zone on a 6-yard run. Cross added the PAT for a 10-0 lead with 4:05 left in the second period.

On Friendswood's next possession, quarterback Brock Foster threw a pass that was intercepted by Quincy Nevins at the Mustang 44 with 2:32 left in the quarter.

Manvel used a 7-play, 44-yard drive to score on a 1-yard plunge by Riley with :45 seconds left before intermission giving the Mavs a 17-0 halftime lead.

Friendswood began the second half with the ball and backup quarterback Matthew Dupuis took control of the offense.

With the ball on the 50, Dupuis dropped back to pass, couldn't find an open receiver so he took off on a 50-yard scoring jaunt with 9:31 left in the third period to close the scoring gap to 17-7. Kaden Smith's 86-yard touchdown strike to WR

"That last touchdown we gave up was frustrating, but our kids were tired," Hall said.

Manvel finished with 274 yards and 10 first downs. Smith threw for 206 yards on 17-of-27

Friendswood had 270 yards and 14 first downs but committed three turnovers and had eight penalties for 75 yards in the second half after none in the first half.

The Mustangs (2-2, 1-1) will face the Richmond Foster Falcons (4-0, 2-0) at Henry Winston Stadium on Friday, Sept. 23 at 7:00 p.m. Foster beat Angleton last week 35-7 in dominating fashion.

How can we who died to sin still live in it? **3** Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? 4 We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life." -Romans 6:1-4

It's no big surprise to see a photo of a clergyperson standing in front of a bride and groom on their wedding day or a picture of a minister holding up a child in front of a congregation presenting the newest member in the church upon celebrating a baptism... but it is rare... and in my heart and mind somewhat disrespectful to see a picture of a pastor leading a funeral procession in a cemetery. I've been wrong before. Death gets our attention... all the time... every time... even God's... whether it be a reigning monarch of 70 years known around the globe or a homeless person with no ID left for dead in a ditch... there's something about death we a very uncomfortable with... even though we will all get our day.

And when it comes to death... just once should be enough... so what's this idea about 'dying daily?' Kind of monotonous don't you think? And is it really necessary? Can't we all just live our lives just like we want and give it our best and then plan for a big send-off? One could say that... but it's good to look around and notice some patterns... like the seasons we experience... as Autumn approaches around the world... trees change colors and the leaves 'fall'... and then the barrenness and emptiness of winter seem like death... only to be followed by Spring's greening of the earth and the flourishing of Summer we all enjoy... but that's not a daily dying like a daily sunset's death and the morning's sunrise birth to start all over again... but you see the point... as the point of the sun's dying (and of course we know the sun's still there) is to provide us a darkness to rest and renew so when the sun comes

to life again in the morning... we get a new start to what's already begun.

My old mentor Martin Luther (1483-1546) used the gift of his baptism... pointing out eternal life's beginning versus waiting for your final hour... to address this idea of daily dying... as this was his way of being 'born again' and again and again... every day... saying... "Baptism means that the old Adam in us should be drowned by daily reflection and repentance, and that all its evil deeds and desires be put to death. It also means that a new person should daily arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever." How many parties do you want to have with a promise from God like that? Or this... from the Greek Orthodox priest and theologian Kallistos Ware (1934-2022) ... "Death is the means of our return to God. It is an encounter with Christ. It could be transformed into an act of worship, into an experience of healing. It is a friend, not an enemy. It is a beginning, not an end." ... and if death leads us back to God then a daily dying should do the same... and... does...

I remember my days as a pastor in New Orleans when from time to time I would stumble on a 'jazz funeral' being held ... where there would be a somber procession as people sang "Nearer My God to Thee" from the church to the cemetery and once the person was laid to rest the crowd and the musicians would turn with an eruption of joy... playing "When the Saints Go Marching In" as a reminder to get on with life... as there's just one life we all get...

So...dying daily is good for all of us...keeping in perspective the idea that once we were not here and some day we will no longer be...but for now...we are...and each day becomes a gift to be used to serve God and neighbor... Faith matters!

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department opened its 79th paddling trail over the summer.


Located in Sabine County on Toledo Bend Reservoir, the Patroon Bayou Paddling Trail is accessed at Holly Park Marina in Milam. The trail is designed in a loop, so shuttles are not needed.

The trail ranges from two to eight miles depending on the route and can take up to six hours to complete. A portion takes paddlers across open-water before moving to Patroon Bayou on the opposite side of the bay. Birders will see wood ducks, egrets, herons, bunting and storks in the summertime while a winter trip enables paddlers to view sparrows, pintails and teals.
