The Brazoria chapter of Texas Master Naturalist held their monthly meeting Wednesday evening September 13, 2023, at the AgriLife building in Angleton.

John Boettiger, membership chairman, reported that Cindy Goodrum, Sheree Muzny, Kathy Purvis, Pam West, Chris Tobola, and Barb Whaley had recertified in August. To recertify, members must have 8 hours of advanced training and 40 volunteer hours.

Boettiger also reported Amanda Gabehart reached the 4,000-volunteer milestone.

This year to date, members have impacted 4,776 adults and 16,237 youth through outreach programs and educational programs such as the "Birds of Prey" programs presented at area schools, Brazoria County Summer Library Programs and the Discovery Environmental Education Program for area 4th and 7th graders at Brazoria NWR.

The meeting keynote speaker was Chris Tobola, Associate Professor at Brazosport College whose topic was "Urban Ecology." Tobola stated 80% of the United States population lives in cities and suburban environments. She noted the human population is the Keystone species in the Urban ecosystem. Among other things humans are introducing exotic species and causing mass faunal extinctions and changing ecosystem stability by altering environmental constraints and biota. Even within the urban areas within Brazoria County, children don't know where their food comes from except from a grocery store and most adults and children have no idea what wildlife they share within their environment.

For any athlete, the biggest individual honor that can be bestowed upon the conclusion of a season is to be named to an allstate roster in his or her sport.

However, that honor also exists for other activities sanctioned by UIL, the organization that governs high-school athletics across the state of Texas.

Last month, Shadow Creek High School Junior Kavya Nandagiri was named to the 2023 UIL All-State Journalism Staff.

In order to qualify, students were required to collect 50 points over the course of the school year by participating in UIL invitational contests in addition to district, regional and state events, as well as Interscholastic League Press Conference and other similar events.

According to Shadow Creek High School journalism coach Cindy Gonzales, achieving this status is no small task. Only 168 students in the state of Texas were named to the staff.

"Being named to the All-State Staff is an incredible achievement for any journalism student," said Gonzales. "It takes a lot of work and determination to be named to this elite group."

The UIL sponsors five journalism contests - news writing, feature writing, editorial writing, headline writing and copy editing. Students compete at the district level, and then the top three places advance to regionals. From regionals, the top three places advance to state competition. In May, Nandagiri took first place in editorial writing at the 2023 UIL Academics State Meet in journalism (6A). In addition, she earned the Tops in Texas award in editorial writing. The UIL judges award this recognition to one of the six first place winners for the 1A-6A conferences for each of the journalism contests. "Being a part of the All-State Journalism team feels so rewarding," Nandagiri said. "Being able to use my skills to compete and win is one of the highlights of my year."

Homestead exemptions still on radar

A discussion on raising the City of Pearland's homestead exemption -- currently at 2.5 percent -will probably happen this fall, city officials say.

"The City of Friendswood has found a way to be at 20 percent," Alex Kamkar told fellow council members during an August discussion. "The City of Katy has increased their homestead exemption. The City of Waco this last year went to the max. We are not the only city that has costs."

Mayor Kevin Cole said he hopes to have a discussion on raising the exemption this fall.

"This time last year, we talked about the homestead tax exemption. I asked to bring it up at the strategic planning workshop in February," Cole said. "It was

not mentioned a single time that day. We've got some promises and assurances we will have that discussion come October."

Cole did note that savings provided by raising the homestead exemption would have to be made up somewhere else, including businesses, or through tax increases.

"There is an offset -- not saying we shouldn't do it," he said.

It was clear on Monday that the council has different views on the topic.

Councilman Rushi Patel said raising the exemption to 20 percent would hurt businesses.

"For \$38 a year savings, we're going to destroy the businesses," he said.

Councilman makes plans for District 29

Pearland City Councilman Alex Kamkar announced he will seek the Republican nomination for District 29 state representative, the seat currently held by Rep. Ed Thompson.

Thompson, a Pearland insurance agent who in his sixth term as state representative, announced in August that he will not seek reelection. District 29 includes Brookside Village, Pearland, Manvel, Alvin as well as the eastern portion of Brazoria County.

A Houston area developer and Pearland resident since 2017, Kamkar was first elected to the Pearland council in 2020.

"I was the fiscal hawk on the city council, and I'll work in Austin to bring deeper, meaningful property tax reform, secure the border and support parental choice," Kamkar states in his

Sept. 14 candidacy announcement. "I'm running for state representative to make sure we keep our community safe, thriving and prosperous for today and tomorrow."

Candidate filing for the March 5, 2024 primaries will open on Nov. 11 and the deadline is Dec. 11.
